Numbers are surprisingly important in the Bible.

Jonah was in the fish for three days, Mary and Joseph found the young Jesus in the Temple after three days searching, Paul was blind for three days and of course Jesus rose on the third day.

In the stories of creation in Genesis God makes the world in six days and on the seventh day rests. In the story of the flood it rained for forty days, it was another forty days before Noah sent out the raven. Moses was on the mountain for forty days; after his baptism Jesus fasted in the wilderness for forty days and he appeared to his disciples for forty days after his resurrection.

In the church year there are forty days to the seasons of both Advent and Lent. On the 1st March we began the forty days to prepare ourselves to remember and celebrate the good news, the great news of Easter Day.

Numbers are important in the Bible and in the church year, and they can be important to us in the rest of life too. One, four, eleven, thirteen, sixteen, seventeen, eighteen, twenty-one, twenty-five, thirty, forty, fifty, sixty, sixty-five, seventy, eighty, ninety, one hundred, one hundred and eighty . . . sorry, I went into darts mode for the last one! All the rest are milestones of events over years in our lives. They may be important birthdays, or anniversaries, or ages at which we gain certain legal rights or responsibilities.

Numbers, or what they represent, are important.

So here we are sitting within the forty days of Lent, what relevance does that have for us in the business of everyday life? As we live through the coming weeks with the regular tasks, and with the unexpected crowding in, perhaps the last thing we need is the church telling us to spend this time preparing ourselves spiritually so that we will understand more deeply the meaning of what it is Jesus did for us.

And yet, if we can, somehow, make some time to remember and reflect on the journey that Jesus made from his baptism to his death on a cross I'm sure God will bless us.

God will bless us as we see in our minds and feel in our hearts Jesus struggling against temptation, being afraid but continuing on against rejection from religious leaders, even his own friends and neighbours. God will bless us as we remember the wisdom of his words, the compassion of his actions, his acceptance and love of those who not only considered themselves unworthy but who were considered unworthy by all around them.

Remembering all that and much more will shed an even brighter light on our being Easter People, living on the Good News side of the Cross, coming from darkness to light, from hopelessness to hope, from death to life.

May you know God's presence with you and his blessings upon you this Lent.

Trainees at Kira Farm

At the charity concert that Jo organised last year, sufficient money was raised for Amigos to sponsor a trainee for a year at Kira Farm. The following profile tells us about the young man who has been given this opportunity.

Name: Ronald Owera Age: 22 Gender: Male District: Lira Education level: Senior 4 (Year 10)

Ronald is 6'6'' tall and a gentle giant. He loves playing football and is great in defence.

Current situation: Ronald lives with his mother, brother and four sisters at home in Lira. Four of his siblings are still in school. Ronald has a good relationship with his family and, as is traditional, Ronald has built his own, small, mud hut where he sleeps on palm tree leaves.

The family own just half an acre of land as his father's family took the rest of their land from them after he died. Women have no rights to land and once the head of the family has gone there is no one to speak on behalf of the wife and children. Ronald rents half an acre of land in the wet season, paying £30 for six months. He grows cassava, beans, sim sim (sesame), g-nuts (peanuts), pineapples and rice. The family use the crops to both eat and sell. Any money raised will pay for clothes, school fees and basic needs. It costs £8.00 a term to send a child to a 'free' government school, this is to cover the cost of academic materials. The family own two cows, three goats and five chickens - they graze the cows by the side of the road.

Life at home isn't easy, rain comes through the grass roof and there isn't enough food to go around. The family eat one meal a day, sometimes two. Likewise, there isn't sufficient money to buy all the household essentials such as sugar, soap and kerosene.

Childhood: Ronald did well at school and enjoyed learning. If he had been able to stay on (the family couldn't afford the fees) he would've liked to become a lawyer.

Ronald grew up during the 25 year war with the Lord's Resistance Army (LRA) – a rebel group known for human rights atrocities which included abducting 40,000 children and forcing many of them to fight as child soldiers or live as sex slaves. The Ugandan government were unable to stop the LRA and the people of northern Uganda had to leave their villages and live in government-run camps for internally displaced persons (IDPs). These camps were created for the safety of the people, but they were rife with disease and violence and 1.7 million people were living in them at the height of the conflict. The conditions were squalid and there was no way to make a living.

As a small child Ronald remembers happy days and his father buying everyone cakes, the family owning land and plenty of cows, but then the LRA and the Karamoja (a tribal group) came and stole everything from them. When Ronald's father was killed by the LRA the family moved to a camp and lived there for three years until Ronald was 11 years old. He says it was a very bad time and he saw many children suffering.

Daily life: At 6.00am Ronald gets up and travels to the garden, one and a half miles away. He works on his crops until 11.00 am, then rests in the heat of the day before taking the goats and cows to graze. In January people set fires all over Uganda to burn the old grass and to catch wild animals. When it's the burning season Ronald has to walk long distances to graze the livestock.

Ronald's sisters are responsible for collecting water – the borehole is a mile away and three times a day they collect two jerry cans of water. His sisters are also responsible for collecting firewood, this is a four hour walk away and the girls go three times a week.

Previous income: When the prices are good Ronald has made £100 a year from rice, and £60 a year from cassava. Sometimes Ronald fetches water for people who make bricks. Over the course of a day he would carry 100 x 20 litre jerry cans and would be paid £10.00 for the day's work. All of the money he has earnt is used to keep the family alive. He has no possessions of his own.

One time Ronald was selling sim sim in the market under a tree and it fell down, badly injuring the young man. Ronald spent a week in hospital and still has the scars.

Joining Kira Farm Development Centre: Ronald was keen to come to Kira Farm as he wanted to learn a skill in life. He believes God helped him get selected as he never expected to be chosen.

While Ronald is at Kira his mother will struggle to grow crops to keep the family going.

His first impressions of Kira are very good – he says the trainees received a wonderful welcome and the shower (a completely new experience!) is amazing. Ronald is also enjoying having a bed to sleep on, sheets to sleep under, and food three times a day. He says life is good and he is very comfortable.

This promising young man is looking forward to studying farming, building, carpentry and computers. In the future Ronald would like to get married and have three children. He dreams of being able to provide for his family, not lacking anything, and being comfortable.

Fairtrade Fortnight 2017: Monday 27th February to Sunday 12th March It's Time to put Fairtrade in your break.



Fairtrade Fortnight is a highlight of the Fairtrade year when we celebrate the support we already give to the Fairtrade movement and when we think about more that we could do.

Here are some of the facts we are already aware of...

Low prices paid to farmers can mean:

• They can only afford to feed their families one meal a day. This can lead to health problems for their children such as stunting.

- They can't afford medical care and put off treatment their families really need.
- They don't have enough money to send their children to school. Lack of money also means pressure for children to work.
- They can't afford to invest in better farming. That means they can't improve the quality of their crops and charge a higher price for them.

Fairtrade means farmers get a better deal for what they grow. This leads to a better and more stable income, and can help them break the cycle of poverty they are trapped in...

Leonidas Jiménez Chaparro, banana farmer. BANAFRUCOOP, Colombia

'Before Fairtrade we were losing money... now we are getting a better price when selling our boxes of bananas. If it weren't for Fairtrade we would have sold our land'.

Rozina Begum, a tea farmer in Bangladesh who for years lived with the bare minimum, often not able to feed the family. Then...'I heard about Traidcraft. I received six training sessions (to grow tea in the garden, sustainable for many years to come). We are now able to see the face of happiness. Now we have electricity... We built a house and we built a kitchen...I have hens and ducks and five cows. The tea plant is a miracle in our life. Now we have beds to sleep in...now I can buy a Saree when I wish. My daughter is going to school. I had never played with any toys in my life, but now during Eid I bought toys for my children. Everything now seems like a sweet dream which is actually our reality.'

Fairtrade exists to make this world of difference, to turn people's lives around, and we at Christ Church, being a Fairtrade Church, are already part of that movement. For example, the tea, coffee and sugar we serve at all our events are fairly traded. Sunday Club enjoy Fairtrade bananas (and sometimes chocolate!) every week. Some of the biscuits we enjoy are fairly traded and many individual members in the congregation make a point of including fairtrade ingredients in the contributions they make to our many social events. But perhaps there is something more we can do...

This Fairtrade Fortnight we can:

Invite our friends for coffee and tea and share some $\ensuremath{\mathsf{Fairtrade}}$ cookies and snacks with them.

Look out for some taster samples of these at our church events this Fortnight (there will definitely be some fairly traded chocolate and fruit at Sing for your Supper on the $10^{\rm th}$ March!)

Look out for and add an extra fairly traded item to our shopping list. Come to Café Church on Sunday 12th March where there will be a small Fair trade stall with a display, home-made cakes AND Fairtrade Fruit Smoothie making!




