Dear Friends,

The year that is so rapidly passing is the 500th anniversary of Luther's action that kick started the Reformation. Thirty-four years ago, on the 500th anniversary of Luther's birth, Pope John Paul II proclaimed the progress of ecumenism with these words: 'We seem to sight from afar the dawn of the advent of a restoration of unity'. Take a moment to re-read those words and perhaps even as members of a united church you, like me, may be struck both by the hope and by the sheer scale of the separation that those words implied.

And yet here we are at the beginning of an even greater advent. An advent that is not just about ecumenism and the restoration of Church unity but the renewing of God's relationship with humanity, and the hope of healing of differences as we focus on the revelation of God we that find in the birth of the Christ child.

In a world of differences, of global tensions between peoples, nations and religions and of local tensions between individuals, perhaps it is only when we focus on the promise and hope of a new born child that other differences are put into their proper perspective.

I'm sure we've all experienced the effect of a baby on a room full of people. The way in which all eyes are drawn to the child, the way that the child becomes the focus of conversation.

As we move through advent towards Christmas Day and the celebration of the birth of Jesus may we put this tiny but powerful image of God's love at the centre of our lives and discover the restoration of unity between ourselves and God, and between all peoples in the face of such grace.

Eddy joins me in wishing you every blessing this Christmas. May this season and this coming year be a time of reconciliation, joy and peace for us all and for the world.

Enough for everyone this Christmas with Christian Aid



At Christmas, we come together to celebrate the birth of Jesus. Food is found at many celebrations in the Bible, so it feels entirely appropriate that it is at the heart of our festivities when we celebrate God's only son coming into the world.

Colette lives in Burkina Faso, West Africa, with her husband, young daughter and baby. Colette's Christmas is not dissimilar to ours. It starts with cooking delicious food and then getting her children ready for church. She prays for her children, and asks that God will give them health and everything they need. When Colette gets home, she greets her neighbours and they share food. They gather together and show their joy by dancing and singing. Like us, they eat special food on Christmas Day. For Colette and her neighbours, this will be rice, goat and spaghetti!

But life has been hard for Colette. She was forced to work at a gold mine every day to earn money to feed her family. Colette spent days at the mining site without finding any gold to sell. She made so little money that she was not able to buy nutritious food. Her daughter Eulalie was very ill and weak, and was diagnosed with malnutrition.

However, Colette found hope through a market garden project supported by Christian Aid. She and her husband were trained in how to grow crops and were provided with tools and seeds. She produces nutritious food to eat and sell, and can work with her children close by. Eulalie is now four years old and has recovered, and her little sister Ornela has, thankfully, never been malnourished. Colette sells some of her vegetables to pay for healthcare and clothes for her girls. She plans to extend her garden to pay for her children to go to school.

Colette's story shows that a family can be saved from the horrors of malnutrition. Landlocked Burkina Faso is one of the world's poorest countries,

with almost half of its 16 million inhabitants living below the poverty line. More than 30% of children under five years old have stunted growth. Christian Aid works with its partners to reduce malnutrition and ensure reliable access to healthy food for those in need, such as women of child-bearing age and young children.

Colette's Christmas is in many ways like our own, filled with generosity and the enjoyment of delicious food. We enjoy and look forward to our special Christmas food and often have too much. Isaiah 58:10 shows God's love for the hungry and oppressed. Jesus revealed this by feeding the hungry many times. When we respond to the hungry and needy, we reflect the light of Christ.

We all probably know the foods we buy that no one really likes, and those that we buy far too much of. Join Christian Aid's Enough for Everyone Christmas Appeal by committing to not buying at least one thing that you know would be wasted. You can turn that pledge into a donation to Christian Aid's work providing life-saving aid and long-term solutions to hunger and malnutrition.

If you save just £13, that could be turned into a village nutrition demonstration in Burkina Faso, teaching more than 25 mothers about nutrition for their children. Together, we could raise £170 to train a nutrition committee to run regular porridge demonstrations and educational sessions in a village like Colette's.

Looking ahead to Lent 2018




Ash Wednesday next year is on February 14th, and this marks the beginning of Lent; Easter Sunday will be on April 1st.

John Wesley's Tree.

A few weeks ago we were visiting some long lost relatives in Winchelsea, which is an old port on the south Kent coast. Opposite my relatives' house is a large tree on the edge of a small green; it was very interesting to read that this tree was a descendant of the one under which John Wesley preached his last open air sermon in 1790. He was 87 years old.

According to Winchelsea's website, John Wesley wrote in his Journal: "I stood under a large tree and called to most of the inhabitants of the town 'The kingdom of Heaven is at hand, repent and believe in the Gospel'. It seems as if all that heard were at the present almost persuaded to be Christians".

I think we can all admire John Wesley's faith and commitment to spread the Gospel - if we didn't before.

Our October Oasis service was shortly before All Saints' Day, and we took the opportunity to remember with thanksgiving loved ones who have died and realise how Jesus shares our pain and loss. With a display of autumn leaves and lit candles before us, we reflected on how Jesus comforted Mary and Martha on the loss of their brother Lazarus, and how he himself was deeply affected. 'Jesus wept' (John 11:35).

We wrote the names of loved ones who have died, and other prayer requests, on paper leaves and placed them with the other leaves on the display. We moved on to the hope we have for the future. We were reminded of the words

of Julian of Norwich, 'All shall be well...'. We sang the hymn 'When peace like a river... it is well with my soul', which the author wrote after a devastating experience of loss, and finally heard of the inspiration that led to the founding of the Children's Hospice South West, in Fremington.

The church is generally cleaned by Bowdens, a cleaning company, and they do a marvellous job but annually we try to have a bit of an extra clean in those areas which are difficult to get to routinely, such as the large light shades in the vestibule etc..

Thank-you to Rev Don for the cups of tea and coffee, to the Property committee for organising the morning, but especially to all those hard workers who did a sparkling job!

Some excerpts from Rachel's emails from Cameroon:-

HI everyone, 2nd Sept 2017



Well it is just over a month since I left home for a new adventure in Cameroon. We are finally here after a 2 week sail. The sail was pretty smooth, not much went crashing to the floor! But it certainly seemed a long 2 weeks without seeing any land. We had some real treats on the way with some amazing dolphins who accompanied us for a while playing on the bow wave.

We arrived 2 and a half weeks ago now. Our first 4 days here were still spent mostly on-

board, as there was no shore leave granted except business! I have never been so happy to do airport pick-up duty! \circledcirc

This is our new home for the next 10 months. One great thing about what I have seen in Cameroon so far is it is very green. The reason for that is

rain! I think this may be one of the wettest places in Africa! It has rained every day since we have been here, but it makes me feel so at home. © I will be bringing wellies back with me next time. ©

All the nurses are now here. We have spent an intense first week setting up and cleaning the hospital. Everything from scrubbing on hands and knees, setting up beds, stocking supplies,



setting up equipment etc. I believe it is now one of the cleanest hospitals in the world! The last week was orientation for the 42 new nurses, and now we are ready!

After so long, we were all on countdown until the first patients arrive!
We got to see patients last week, as they were screened on the dock and came in for investigations. We were so excited. Then we heard there were 2 patients who needed medical attention and couldn't wait until our opening day (!) so we opened the hospital 4 days early, thanks to nurses volunteering to work the weekend. An interesting start! Our first patient was also the lightest! - A 3 month old baby boy (with a cleft lip and palate) who weighed 2kg!

I haven't seen too much on land at the moment but look forward to exploring. Being a new country to Mercy Ships, we have much exploring to do.

One of the most exciting things this last week was to see our site for the women's health clinic, which we are going to set up temporarily this year. We are using a local hospital which is currently only utilizing 30%. The

officials we met this week were very welcoming and very keen to help us however they can.

Well I look forward to sharing about patients next time.

Praying people - please pray that:

The right people come to the screening.

That all 42 new nurses settle in quickly and the 30 who have also been before.

The women's health clinic – looks promising but so much to do still and so much unknown.

That we make good relationships with the locals and government so that we can work well together and help them in investing in their future better.

Pray that as the wards and dental clinic open tomorrow things will go well and they will become areas of healing and joy! (Monday 4th September).

Newsletter October in Douala

October 29th 2017

After 2 months, things are in full flow. We have already completed our orthopedic program. The joy of seeing bent legs made straight has finished for Cameroon, but we still see them coming daily to rehab with their casts on and managing to get around amazingly well with both legs in casts. Next week plastic surgery starts. This will be mainly burns victims. This will be our heaviest work-load on the wards as many will have a lengthy recovery process. We look forward to seeing that ward full of life again.



I still spend one day a week back on the max-fax ward. Here is one of our patients: Valerie, who had a parotid tumour.

The women's fistula clinic has been open for the last 3 weeks. On Monday it will open for the post-op women. The first 8 patients will be transferred from the ship to the clinic for the

remainder of their recovery. It is an exciting venture, although not an easy one. There are many challenges involved with having a mercy ship's site not within the ship. For the nurses working there, it is very different to having the comfort of working on the ship, where we are well set up in medical and surgical support. They are a great team however, and show excellent attitudes with the challenges they face. They are also required to live in a house off the ship, which also has its own set of challenges! Some ship-related challenges we are also experiencing includes the delay in our supplies arriving. I never thought that the Hurricane Harvey in the US which delayed the ship leaving with our container of supplies, would have such an effect here! We still have bed frames and mattresses in the container for the women's clinic that opens Monday! Also the feed that we use for the tube feeding for patients, we currently only have 1 days supply, amongst many other things! So we learn to be patient, and we learn to be creative! And we learn to pray more! Amazingly despite the lack of galley supplies, they have managed to feed us well and we haven't noticed any lack of food! I try and get off the ship once at a weekend and once in the week if possible. It is easy to forget there is an outside at times! It's often for a swim somewhere or going out for coffee. We can't go far right now as there has been some unrest in some of the places near to Douala. We have therefore had a lot of places that are no-go areas for crew. Hopefully these will be lifted soon and we can travel a bit further than just within the town. That's it for news I think. Thanks for all your support, without which I would

'what is she thinking'

'What was she thinking'.....this week I had one of the most random of all journeys! I ended up transporting one of our potential patients from our accommodation center to the ship to be assessed to see if she was a suitable patient. She was a beautiful lady, probably in her late 20s, dressed in bright



yellow and green, and a big bright smile that lit up her whole face. The interesting thing about this journey was that she spoke only Fulfoulde language, not a single word of French or English. I don't know a single word of Fulfoulde! During the journey across the city to the ship, I kept trying a bit of French as I though she might know a few odd words. She just smiled and giggled and then said a few things in her own language. This happened

several times on our journey. I loved hearing her little giggle. I couldn't help but wonder 'what is she thinking'. She was from a very remote area out in the country, at least one day's journey from the ship. I had no idea if she had ever been to a city or seen a ship, or even the sea. What amazing trust, or was it desperation (?) that enabled her to trust me to drive her in the Land Rover to somewhere she could not imagine. Did she even know where I was taking her? She gasped when we got through the port gate and the ship came into view. As I parked the car and opened her door, she beamed and said

'merci beaucoup!' - she did know some French! I prayed as she went into the screening tent that we would be able to help this precious lady, and that on her next journey may she have a healed body.

This is not the lady who I brought to the ship, it is one of the other ladies who is celebrating







from a fistula. I long for this for my travel companion too. She is due to be admitted to the ship today, then hopefully surgery tomorrow!


The Tale of a Shoebox
