## Message

Dear Friends,

Numbers are surprisingly important in the Bible.

Jonah was in the fish for three days, Mary and Joseph found the young Jesus in the Temple after three days searching, Paul was blind for three days and of course Jesus rose on the third day.

In the stories of creation in Genesis God makes the world in six days and on the seventh day rests. In the story of the flood it rained for forty days, it was another forty days before Noah sent out the raven. Moses was on the mountain for forty days, after his baptism Jesus fasted in the wilderness for forty days and he appeared to his disciples for forty days after his resurrection.

In the church year there are forty days of the seasons of both Advent and Lent, the season we are now in. Forty days to prepare ourselves to remember and celebrate the good news of Easter day.

Numbers are important in the Bible and in the church year, and they can be important to us in the rest of life too. One, four, eleven, sixteen, seventeen, eighteen, twenty-one, twenty-five, forty, fifty, sixty, sixty five, seventy, one hundred, one hundred and eighty . . . sorry, I went into darts mode for the last one! All the rest are milestones of events over years in our lives. They may be important birthdays, or anniversaries, or ages at which we gain certain legal rights.

Numbers, or what they represent, are important.

So here we are sitting within the forty days of Lent, what relevance does that have for us in the business of everyday life? As we live through the coming weeks with the regular tasks and the unexpected crowding in, perhaps the last thing we need is the church reminding us to spend this time preparing ourselves spiritually so that we will understand more deeply the meaning of what it is Jesus did for us.

And yet if we can, somehow, make some time to remember and reflect on the journey that Jesus made from his baptism to his death on a cross I'm sure God will bless us.

Bless us as we see in our minds and feel in our hearts Jesus struggling against temptation, being afraid but continuing on against rejection by religious leaders, even by his own friends. Bless us as we remember the wisdom of his words, the compassion of his actions, his acceptance and love of those who not only considered themselves unworthy but who were considered unworthy by all around them.

Remembering all that and much more will shed an even brighter light on our being Easter People, living on the Good News side of the Cross of Good Friday, coming from darkness to light, from hopelessness to hope, from death to life.

May you know God's presence with you and his blessings upon you as you continue your journey through Lent.



## From overseas - An update from Rachel:-

## Return to Cameroon

February 2018

After a great 2 weeks at home over New Year, back to very full on life back on the AFM! My life currently revolves around reviewing many applicants for the next country Guinea. Now we are half way through Cameroon, we are already talking about the big hospital pack-up, making summer plans and the work that needs to be done in the shipyard. When I got back to the ship, there was a big intake of new nurses who started



in January. It does take a while to get to know everyone, but they have settled in and are finding their feet well now. Despite the busyness at this time of year, in preparing to finish Cameroon and preparing ahead for Guinea, my day of working on the wards is always a great pleasure to me. It always reminds me what I am doing here. We really have a wonderful team, and excellent nurses.

Yesterday we had the Minister of Health on-board. He arrived with a large group, and I had to identify patients to show him and ones that he could interact with. These visits can be a bit stressful! But this one went really well, and they were all very engaging, and interested.

Well, hope that there are some signs of spring at home. I really miss that season.

## An introduction to Prossy:-



We at Christ Church are very happy to announce that, following on the successful sponsorship of Ronald Owera last year at Kira Farm, we have found ourselves able to sponsor another trainee for a year. This is thanks to the kindness and generosity of some of the church groups as well as other donations. The following profile tells Amigos us about the young woman who has been given this opportunity.

She has already written two letters full of excitement and gratitude, is in the process of learning conservational farming skills and has learnt how to use a sewing machine. She says:

'To me being on Kira is like an open door to big dreams and a better life, I am more than willing to fully utilize this opportunity you have blessed me with'.

Name: Prossy Nakabira

Age: 17

**Gender:** Female District: Wakiso

**Education level**: Senior 4 (Year 10)

Family: Prossy lives with her mother and her big sister, who is a single mum and has two children to take care of. Prossy's sister sells secondhand clothes

from a small shop, enabling the family to rent a small two-room house. In the evenings Prossy's mum sells fruit and roasted maize at the side of the road, making around £1.50 each day.

Prossy and her family used to live in the west of Uganda but when Prossy's father died ten years ago his relatives threw the bereaved family off the land. In the west women have no land rights so if a woman is widowed the land lawfully belongs to the late husband's family.

**Education:** Growing up Prossy dreamt of becoming a nurse, however she wasn't able to complete her education because her sister couldn't afford the school fees once she had children of her own. Prossy says the best thing in her life was completing Year 10 and she firmly believes studying is the most valuable thing a person can do. As a child she found it very difficult when she was sent home from school because she hadn't been able to pay the fees (it's common for children in Uganda to drop in and out of school depending on funds available at home).

**Daily life:** At 6.00am Prossy wakes, cleans the compound and makes a cup of tea for all the family. She spends the morning washing the family's clothes and then prepares lunch. In the afternoon Prossy irons all of the clothes and has a rest before she prepares the evening meal. Other daily tasks involve purchasing water and charcoal and carrying it home. She tends to go to bed around 10.00pm. Prossy has never earnt any money of her own, she has to ask her sister for anything she needs. For fun Prossy likes to play netball with her friends in the neighbourhood.

**Joining Kira Farm Development Centre:** Although Prossy's family will miss having her at home, they are delighted she was selected for this golden opportunity of gaining vocational skills. Prossy has settled into life quickly at Kira Farm and is appreciating the good food - and the frequency of it - three meals a day is a novelty! She says she is enjoying the comfortable beds and lovely bedrooms (the trainees sleep in small rooms in triple bunkbeds).

Prossy has made lots of friends already and is relishing the opportunity of meeting other young people from all over Uganda. She is particularly looking forward to studying tailoring, hairdressing, computers and farming. In the future she would like to set up a hairdressing and tailoring business and has plans to launch her tailoring enterprise out of her sister's clothes shop. One day, when she is financially secure, Prossy would like to get married and have two children.

## And three excerpts form the first two emails from Richard in Kenya:-

......I have had my first day back in the lab and enjoyed every minute of it. It felt really good to be demonstrating, explaining and then getting the students to do their own experiments. They are so keen to learn and understand, and so appreciative of help. Sadly I shall have to wait to show films to them as my little loudspeakers are not loud enough and the school equipment has broken irretrievably. I need to get to Webuye to try and buy a bigger system. However I am very happy teaching and things are gradually falling into place............

......My first full week has been eventful. I have finally been able to visit the new dormitory named after my mother – Doris Dormitory - and, compared to the older dormitories, it is airy and spacious and the girls really like it. At the moment there are 8 double decker beds in each cubicle giving them easy access. The walls are yellow and reflect the sunlight to make the whole place bright and welcoming. There are security bars on all the windows, but each cubicle has two opening windows with bars attached so that in an emergency the girls can escape through the windows, I was a bit disappointed with the ablution area. Because of the water shortage there can be no supply of water to taps or showers. What was to have been flush toilet cubicles has been converted into little wash rooms so that the girls have privacy. So now there are about a dozen washing cubicles and a set of sinks in the middle with taps which cannot function yet. The main thing is that the girls are very happy with the arrangement. A photograph and dedication to my mother was hung up on an archway at the centre of the dormitory.........

.........The shortage of water continues to be a problem. The pipeline from Mt Elgon does not bring in enough water during the night for our needs. A tractor and trailer bring in a load of containers full of water every day so that the girls can fill their bowls and containers from the trailer parked in front of the dining hall. It is a very time consuming process and a very noisy one. There is always a very colourful array of plastic around the trailer waiting for water. I visited the Primary school across the road and met the new headmaster, Mr Lupao. He has really made changes and improved the school and I was most impressed. I came to an agreement with him that money from Christ Church Barnstaple would pay for 20 new desks in each of the new classrooms. The rooms are intended for the youngest children so 3 of them can be accommodated on each desk. I just hope they can be finished in time for me to get photographs before I leave............
