

Message

Dear Friends,

As the scaffolding remains on the front of the church you may well be wondering just what is happening to address the issues we have with the building and potential costs of at least repairing, if not improving the beautiful church building we have. I think it is important that you are kept informed as it is a subject that will soon come to the Church Meeting as we seek together the way forward.

There have been discussions in the Elders' Meetings about how best to tackle the issue and especially how we as a church respond to this challenge in a way that is positive and helps us to discover and define God's mission for us in the years ahead.

And so it was that we held an Elders' Day on Saturday the 16th February when we had time to give the matter some serious thought and we are very grateful to David Wilson for hosting the day at his offices.

The day centred around our Mission Statement (at the top of this letter) and after a time of worship led by Rev. Sue Macbeth, both Dawn from "Action for Children" and Rebecca from "Live at Home" spoke to us about their experiences of working in the local community and in particular the needs of young families and the elderly. We also had to hand a wealth of information and statistics provided by David about the challenges our community is facing.

We then looked at what we and other churches in the town are already doing, recognising that no one church can do it all, but that each church is called to do that part that God calls us to do and it was good to hear what other churches are doing. It was an encouraging day in many ways, not least because it reminded us once again that we are already doing a great deal, especially given the fact that other than myself and Jo everyone else involved is a volunteer giving their time so generously through their own sense of commitment.

The final session of the morning was led by David who extremely helpfully and clearly outlined some of the key ways in which the town centre is changing and will continue to change in the coming years, with direct implications on the needs of our community. This was especially helpful in enabling us to consider the church's mission not simply as a reaction to what is already happening but to plan for flexibility and be ready as things change.

During a lunch provided by David and Ronnie (thank you so much, it was lovely!) we were joined by Rev. Dr Nigel Dilkes, the Minister of St Mary's Pilton who stayed with us for a time of worship and reflection beautifully led by Sue. After hearing about his church's exploration of many of the same issues Nigel left us and we began to focus in on what we felt the key areas of Christ Church's mission may lie now and in the years to come.

It was an exciting and encouraging process, recognising and celebrating what is happening and the relationship we have with our community that can be built on

as well as considering possible ways in which we can provide the resources needed without having to place even greater demands on the time of those of you who are already doing so much.

A final huge note of thanks goes to Ruth O'Donovan from the Catholic Church who agreed to act as our facilitator for the day and who was so helpful in being able to look at things from an external perspective and brilliantly summarised our thinking.

We now need to take time to reflect and pray and pray and pray as we get ready as a church to take the next step on this exciting journey as we continue to seek to express the love of Christ for everyone.

We learnt from Dawn more about the work of Action for Children and the needs of our community action for




they are facing.

A Golden Opportunity Francisco starts his journey on Kira with joy

Last year, full of admiration, we joyfully followed the life-changing and transforming journey of Prossy Nakabira on Kira Farm in Uganda. This year we have the same opportunity and privilege to sponsor another young person and to hear from them as they make a similar journey...

So it is with great pleasure that we introduce Francisco Olanya. He is 23 years old and comes from a district called Kitqum in the Northern part of Uganda. He is described as a quietly spoken, hardworking, young man with the responsibility of taking care of his mother and siblings weighing heavily on his shoulders.

When younger, Francisco managed to earn the necessary funds to pay his school fees until he reached Year 8. But then he left school so he could help his younger siblings with their school fees. Culturally, this would be expected of him as the eldest son.


His family own 28 acres of land and grow cotton, sim sim (sesame), sorghum, sunflowers, sweet potatoes, cassava, pumpkin and okra to eat and sell. Francisco has one ox, one cow and 15 chickens. He has a good head for business. Last year he earned £1,300 by selling the cotton and sesame he had grown. He's left the money with his mum to look after everyone throughout the year while he is at Kira.

Francisco is settling in well and is very happy to be on Kira Farm and soak up

everything on offer. He has already sent the following letter, full of excitement, gratitude and hope...

'How are you doing my dear friends? Hope all is well with you. I received some good news yesterday that you will be supporting my training on Kira Farm. I have been overwhelmed with this news, life is getting better every day that I have so far been on Kira. From getting this opportunity of being selected for the training, to now having a sponsor. Wow, I am really so happy.

Back home I stay with my mother, one sister and two brothers. I enjoy having them around as they are very good people. My father, however was taken away by the Lord's Resistance Army, a rebel group responsible for taking so many lives in Northern Uganda. I have never seen him since I was 6 years old.



As a family we have six grass thatched mud huts in our compound, which provide sleeping spaces, as well as a kitchen. I built my own as well where I sleep on a grass mat on the floor with a blanket. As a child I grew up wanting to become a doctor because there was need for more doctors in Northern Uganda.

Coming to Kira Farm is the best thing that's happened in my life! I am already learning more farming skills and also skills in carpentry and building and I thank God that I was selected. Kira's maize looks very well planted. I believe this is the right place to learn about farming. In the future I would like to get married and have two children, become a carpenter and be the best father and farmer in Kitgum.

I am looking forward to fully utilizing this opportunity. I have seen a number of youths coming back to our village fully transformed through Kira training. I believe I am not going to be any different from them, hopefully just being better.

You will be hearing from me during my all stay on Kira. Hopefully I will also hear from you so that I get to know you more.

'Presbyteral Synod' Comes to North Devon

What is Presbyteral Synod I hear you ask!

Some years ago, it was decided that, to avoid confusion over the use of the term 'minister' to describe someone who has been ordained by the church, ministers would be split into two groups – deacons who are ordained into the Diaconate, and presbyters who are ordained to the role of word and sacrament. That caused confusion then and it causes some confusion still today!

Each year, the District presbyters (those who are active and those who have retired from active work) gather together to share in a time of fellowship, mutual support and to consider any matters that the Church has referred to the meeting. It is an important gathering for all presbyters as it gives the opportunity to reflect upon and renew our ordination vows. The day is one of worship and discussion, but also has the responsibility to give permission to those presbyters who are asking the Church to be able to 'sit down' (that is to retire from active ministry), to affirm and recommend the progress of probationer presbyters and to reflect upon the lives and ministry of those who have been taken into glory over the last year. For all presbyters, this is an important and meaningful gathering.

This year, our Circuit here has the honour of welcoming the Presbyteral Synod and providing that time for around 130 presbyters from across the District, to gather and share together. The meeting is to be held on 20th March and will be hosted at Christ Church Barnstaple.

Events such as this always need those who can provide support on the day. As the hosts of the event, we are asked to provide hospitality to our visitors. That means providing tea/coffee and biscuits at the start of the day as people arrive; to be around to direct folk to the nearby car parks and to welcome them into the church; to provide teas/coffees at lunchtime (the visitors will bring their own lunches to share); to offer tea/coffee and cakes at the end of the meeting before people head off home.

If you think that you could offer any support on the day to help out, then please contact either Eff Poole who is co-ordinating things at Christ Church Barnstaple, Meg Jeffrey in the Circuit Office or myself.

The Circuit is grateful for the co-operation of Christ Church Barnstaple in enabling us to host this event as it means that their regular activities will be disrupted, but it is our way of offering our thanks for the work and ministry undertaken by the presbyters in our District.

BARNSTAPLE STREET PASTORS

An activity on our premises that not everyone will know about is the Street Pastors, who meet every Saturday, 9.00pm to 2.00am (yes, 2.00am the following day!), and are a presence in the town centre streets. Two of them came to our church meeting on 20 January to tell us about their work. Here is what they said....



Roger Bartlett thanked Christ Church for making their premises available to the Street Pastors as their base on Saturday evenings from 9.00pm to 2.00am. The movement had begun in London and had arrived in Barnstaple some ten years ago. The Street Pastors are a non-judgmental presence in the town centre streets at that time and are supported by Prayer Partners at the base. Their ministry is to the homeless, those who had drunk too much, and people abandoned by their mates and who are not well enough to get themselves safely back home alone. All, whatever their state, are precious in God's eyes. If there is a fight, they do not dive in to sort it out, but observe, and are a calming presence. Their aim is not to evangelise. The police have noted that through their presence crime has plummeted. The prayer ministry is the 'engine room' of their work. People such as church members can be involved: as actual street pastors, as prayer partners at the base, or as friends. Forms are available on which people can sign up, indicating the level of support they are prepared to give.

Gareth Owens, who lives in South Molton, described how he had become involved. He noted that three quarters of those they deal with have no church links at all, and for them the street pastors provide a positive image of the church, in contrast to the unfortunate image of the church often given in the media. 'Where would Jesus be?' He would be there with people, walking alongside them. Two Bible texts in particular were their inspiration: [people] 'harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd' (Matt: 9:36); and 'let your light shine' in the darkness (Matt: 5:16). He had been nervous when he had first begun to work as a street pastor, but 'God has given me the tools for my self-growth.'

Fairtrade Fortnight Monday 25 February to Sunday 10 March

Fairtrade Fortnight is the highlight of the year for the Fairtrade movement in the UK. It is when individuals, groups and companies come together to celebrate the people in developing countries who grow our food but who are often underpaid and exploited. Fairtrade is also celebrating 25 years of Fairtrade in the UK.

This year the focus of Fairtrade Fortnight is on cocoa, women and living income. Cocoa prices have dipped to crisis levels over the last few years. Many farmers, men and women, are underpaid and exploited so they can't earn enough for the basics most of us would take for granted such as education, housing and food, simply because they don't earn a living income. The situation can be even worse for women as they are often overlooked and under-represented and often receive even less money for their crop.

£1.86 is the amount a cocoa farmer in West Africa needs to earn each day in order to achieve a living income. Currently, a typical cocoa farmer in Cote d'Ivoire lives on around 74p a day, which falls far short of what is required to meet their family's needs. Almost all cocoa farmers in West Africa live in poverty. Incomes are low and uncertain.

For women the situation is even worse. They may plant and harvest on the farm, look after children, carry water, collect wood, cook and clean for the family, and transport the cocoa beans to market, but often with fewer rights than men.

This is why the Fairtrade Foundation are campaigning for a living income to become a reality for cocoa farmers in West Africa. If we can all work together with governments, chocolate companies and retailers to make the commitments and policies necessary, then we can make it happen. It is very sobering to think that even though the price of cocoa on the world market has fallen, we still pay the same if not more for our bar of chocolate. This means what we pay for a chocolate bar is being shared among others in the supply chain, and the share going to farmers continues to slide. At present only 8% of chocolate bars sold in the UK are Fairtrade certified.

A living income means enough money to live a simple but dignified life, paying for essentials such as clothing, medicine and schooling. They are not luxuries, but a human right for everyone.



So this Fairtrade Fortnight 2019 the campaign is about telling the story of cocoa farmers through women: 'She Deserves a Living wage'. 'She Deserves running water'. 'She Deserves a doctor'... By recognising what they do, we can create a platform for the amazing and inspiring women farmers across the Fairtrade network. They are leading the way in changing attitudes, behaviours and, ultimately, their communities – supported by Fairtrade and its push for women's empowerment.

So what can we as individuals do?

Buy Fairtrade Chocolate! Perhaps one of the simplest ways to support cocoa farmers around the world is by buying Fairtrade chocolate and cocoa. While this doesn't immediately solve all the issues, keeping up the demand allows farmers to sell more of their cocoa on Fairtrade terms thus increasing their income. NB.The Co-op chocolate confectionery range is 100% Fairtrade.

And sign the Petition! Fairtrade is calling on the UK Government to make sure that our trade with developing countries puts poverty reduction first, delivering living incomes for all. The petition opened for signatures on Monday 25 February. Postcards to sign are on the display which will be in the vestibule during the Fortnight.

Whatever you do to further Fairtrade, it will make a difference. More ideas and details are on the Fairtrade Foundation website.



DAA Dementia Action Alliance

Did you know that there is a group of people interested in supporting those living with dementia and their carers in Barnstaple and surrounding areas? The BDAA (Barnstaple Dementia Action Alliance) was formed in 2014 and the South Molton Dementia Alliance more recently. They are made up of individuals and representatives of various organisations and meet monthly. The BDAA aims to promote awareness of dementia and seeks to improve the lives of those living with dementia and their carers, it is open to all. If you or someone you know is interested in knowing more about dementia or the BDAA why not come along to their next meeting: their AGM on 13th March 2019 at the Barnstaple Library in the Henry Williamson Room at 6pm. You would be very welcome.

The BDAA is a friendly group with a casual approach who are actively seeking further support to develop the group. Committee positions will be available for management of the group.

BDAA can help signpost to support activities locally and can also arrange free 'Dementia Friends' awareness sessions for individuals or organisations. So come along on the 13th March, get involved and support your local Dementia Action Alliance, find out what is going on to support local people living with dementia or share ideas of what more you think needs to be done.


