

# Community Links- the first stage or why we need to spend £250,000 on our building.

Following on from Reverend Don's outline of the Community Links Project and the exciting vision for our church's outreach (see Messenger September p3) David Wilson answers some questions about the first stage of the project – works to the building fabric:

## Why are we spending so much on the building- I thought all the jobs were sorted out in our scheme of 1998?

Our scheme in 1998 very much focused on the rebuilding of the hall and the remodeling of the internal spaces to give us the welcoming and accessible premises we have today. Very little external repairs (save roofing) were included in this scheme over twenty years ago and no stone repairs.

### What is included?

The scheme includes works to the South (Bear Street) elevation with replacement of coping stones to the gable high up, replacement of eroded stones, repointing and stone cleaning of this gable. The works also tackles dealing with the settlement of the wall to the right hand side of the East (sealed) doorway where the arch has slipped and a line of settlement can be seen running up the face of the building. To stop the decline the Structural Engineer has proposed a buttress to the side (within the car park) and a strengthening of the wall foundations in this area.

### Will the church fall down?

Not immediately! However repairs and deterioration will get slowly worse, and every year that goes by will make the repairs more expensive. Also because of the danger of falling debris we would at some point have to shut the premises.

### When can we get rid of the scaffolding in Bear Street?

The scaffolding is to protect pedestrians from falling mortar or stone. It can be removed once we have raised the money and started the works !

### Why does it cost so much?

Most of the work is labour intensive and relies on traditional craft skills, and is therefore expensive. The access for working at height safely above the pavement also adds to the cost. At the moment costs are based on estimates and will be refined after competitive tenders are received for the works. There is a healthy contingency built into the figure, and the necessary fees and VAT at 20% of the cost are included.

### When can work begin?

We need to make applications to the Methodist Circuit, District and Connexion for support as well as the URC. When we have an idea of the shortfall from this

and our own fundraising including our Gift day, we need to make a raft of applications for grants from Charitable Trusts. With meeting cycles and time to make decisions we are thinking that this will take months rather than weeks.

# Will work affect the activities within the building? Will we have to shut for a bit?

We should be able to carry out the works from the outside with occupation of part of the car park only, so that the premises will still be able to be used.

# Why spend money on an old building when its only going to need more spending in the future?

Well, good point but the Elders did discuss the hypothetical prospect of selling up and moving to a brand new building. The feeling was that even if such a site or building could be found, it would probably be on an industrial estate or the edge of town, not right at the heart of the community where we are at present. We are also aware of the rich Christian history of the building (from the Bible Christians onwards) and the fact that we are responsible for preserving the investment carried out by faithful members over the years previously. This gives us the responsibility and opportunity to build on and secure their legacy, and to renew our mission for the premises.

### **ST FRANCIS OF ASSISI**

We are fast approaching the time of the feast day of St Francis of Assisi, this is celebrated on  $4^{\text{th}}$  October, very near to the time of St Michael and all Angels ( $29^{\text{th}}$  September) and considered by the Christian church to be a powerful time of reflection and of giving thanks for the abundance of the natural world.

The life and message of St Francis, although he lived 800 years ago, is very relevant to us all in the  $21^{st}$  century.

St Francis was originally christened John, his father was a wealthy cloth merchant and his mother a beautiful French woman. He was born in France and known as Francis (the Frenchman).

As a teenager he was rather a tearaway and lived a hedonistic lifestyle. He did not wish to follow in his father's footsteps as a cloth merchant. Instead he had dreams of himself as a knight, who were the action men of the day. At the time there was war between Assisi and Perugia and Francis eagerly joined the cavalry.

With little military training Francis was soon captured and his wealthy clothing noted. He was imprisoned for a year, whilst a ransom was requested from his father. During his time in prison it is reported that he experienced religious visions, this may have been because he was seriously ill. On his release he heard a voice from God from the bell of the abandoned church of San Damiano in Assisi, instructing him to re-build God's church. This Francis did.

Francis was still expected to earn a living and his father sent him to the market to sell cloth. Francis noted a beggar and gave him a bolt of expensive silk velvet to sell. This led to an altercation with his father and Francis renounced all wealth and his complete inheritance in order to lead the life of a poor man. During his time in prison he had been reflecting on the kind of life he had been living and was already becoming very aware of the needs of the poor. By renouncing his wealth and caring for those who were poor both in financial and in spiritual terms he felt he was leading the life that God had chosen for him.

He founded the monastic order of St Francis and helped to found the women's Order of the Poor Clares. Francis spent much of his time in meditation in the caves and places of nature around Assisi, he lived a simple life, living on the fruits and berries of the earth, so was in fact a Vegan, a way of life which is becoming more widespread. His clothing was simple and unadorned and he possessed only that which was strictly necessary. He had great love and respect for all life, including the animal kingdom.

There has been quite a movement to romanticise Francis, with many paintings of him with birds and animals. Although he undoubtedly had a special connection with the animal kingdom this can detract from the essence of St Francis, which was primarily, love of God and all creation and a special awareness of the needs of the poor.

In these times when many have an over-abundance of food, clothing and goods, it may be well to remember Francis and the simple life and buy only what we truly need. Remembering also to respect God's earth and nature's

bounty.

To quote the words of Saint Pope John Paul II 'As a friend of the poor who was loved by God's creatures, St Francis invited all creation – animals, plants, natural forces even Brother Sun and Sister Moon – to give honour and praise to the Lord. The poor man of Assisi gives us striking witness that when we are at peace with God we are better able to devote ourselves to building up that peace with all creation which is inseparable from peace among all peoples'.

I will finish with the words of John Paul II 'It is my hope that the inspiration of Saint Francis will help us to keep ever alive a sense of 'fraternity' with all those good and beautiful things that God has created'.

### **Dordogne Walnut and Prune Roast**

### **Ingredients**

- 8 ounces 200 grms Walnuts
- 4 ounces 100 grms Dried pitted prunes
- 1 onion, plus crushed garlic if desired, chopped and fried until soft
- 1 egg plus a little vegetable stock
- Thick slice of bread, this can be gluten-free


Tablespoon mixed chopped herbs from the garden or tspn dried mixed herbs

### <u>Method</u>

Soak the prunes in water or apple juice over night. In a food processor or blender chop the walnuts and slice of bread, add the herbs. Beat the egg with a little stock, add the cooked onion and garlic, seasoning and liquid to the walnut mixture and mix well. Put half the mixture in a well-greased 1lb loaf tin, then add the softened prunes, finally add the second half of the walnut mixture, smooth down and dot with margarine or butter. Cook at Gas Mark 6 or 200°C for about 30 minutes.

<u>Note</u> If you have a Vegan friend to dinner or a guest with an egg allergy omit the egg and add more stock.


### Community Links Project – Prayer Team

If anyone feels that they would like to join the Prayer Team please contact Shirley Baxter.






