The Methodist and United Reformed Churches, as well as others, are producing a great deal of material for worship at home at this time.


Methodist Church worship at home resources can be accessed at methodist.org.uk/worship-during-coronavirus

### Dear Friends,

You are all in my thoughts and prayers during this strange unsettling time we are living through.

This is my first letter to you following the sad but necessary decision to close the church for all activities, including acts of worship.

I am writing this letter while we are very much in the season of Lent in a world that is itself sombrely on a journey through the dark pandemic of coronavirus to the longed for light of new life.

Perhaps like me it has made you think about what it means to be church when we don't even seem to be able to fulfil the words of Jesus, words so often quoted at church events throughout history when only a few are present; "For where two or three gather in my name, there I am with them." (Matthew 18:20).

But even in this season of Lent, even with all that we and the world are going through, we are an Easter people. Which is why, at the very end of Matthew's gospel, after the pain, darkness and death of Good Friday, and after the joy, light and resurrection life of Easter Day, Jesus spoke these words to the eleven remaining disciples; "Surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." (Matthew 28:20b).

With us always, not just when we worship together, not just when two or three gather in his name, but always with us. God with us always redeeming the world by resurrection light. God with each one of us always, at home, in the hospital, in troubled hearts, minds and souls.

We may be apart, for a while, but we are still church. For the moment scattered like bread broken for communion and yet each part of the one body.

Let us join together in praying for the redemption and resurrection that will surely come for ourselves and the world. Let us join together in praying that what the world is going through will, in the end, create a world where God's love is known and shared and where the joy and preciousness of community is understood, celebrated and protected as never before.

Please keep in touch with each other regularly by phone, email, text, Facebook, WhatsApp, or good old-fashioned letters and let's keep on praying for one another.

Lord, thank you that whatever is happening, we are in one another's thoughts and prayers.

And Lord, that you promise to always be with us. Amen.

### **Ethical Investment**

One of the EcoChurch survey questions asks if our funds are ethically invested. The following info comes from the EcoChuch website and is definitely food for thought:

Investment is not a 'morally neutral' activity. That's the message from Edward Mason, Head of Responsible Investment of the Church Commissioners for England. "Churches and charities cannot simply be 'passive consumers' of investment products. They have an opportunity and a responsibility – and often a reputational imperative to try actively to shape the way investment management is conducted on their behalf."

Christian Aid's "Green Light Campaign" suggests money should be invested in the <u>world we want</u> rather than in risky projects. This campaign aims to take the fight for climate justice straight to those who shape our economy. Christian Aid points out that many pension providers have big investments in 'dirty fossil fuel projects', which is bad for the planet and risky for pensions.

It's not just about being 'environmental'. It's also about being a Christian witness. That's how the Methodist Church feels about investment. Around £billion of Methodist money is invested in stocks, shares, bonds and other schemes. This money comes from individual churches and circuits, as well as national funds. All the money is invested in line with ethical principles.

We're now looking at our Christ Church investments to find out how ethical they are - watch this space!


'I have attached a photo of me while clearing my plot and will keep you in the know about how planting goes, I can't wait!

### ST GEORGE OF ENGLAND



St George, who is the patron saint of England, was born around 280 AD. Legend has it that he was born in Cappadocia in modern day Turkey.

Not much is known about his early life but it is understood that he was born into a wealthy Christian family. He became a soldier under the Emperor Diocletian. At that time Christianity was growing in popularity, Diocletian became nervous about this and ordered a crackdown on the Christian community,

giving an edict that all Christian soldiers be expelled and the Roman soldiers forced to make the traditional pagan sacrifice.

George refused and denounced this edict in front of his fellow soldiers, proudly declaring that he was a Christian.

Diocletian attempted to sway him from his beliefs with offers of wealth and land, George refused and was beheaded on 23 April 303.

### **GEORGE AND THE DRAGON**

Many people when they think about St George bring to mind that he was a slayer of dragons. This, of course, is a myth, originally appearing in stories told by the medieval Eastern Orthodox Church which were brought back by the Crusaders in the  $10^{\text{th}}$  and  $11^{\text{th}}$  Centuries.


According to one story, a town in Libya had a lake in which lived a plague-infested dragon. Gradually the inhabitants were being killed off by the dragon, so they started to appease its appetite by feeding it two sheep a day. When they ran out of sheep the King devised a kind of lottery system to feed it local children. One day the King's own daughter was chosen, but fortunately at that moment St George happened to ride past. He offered to slay the dragon if the people promised to convert to Christianity, he slayed the dragon and there was a rapid increase in the Christian community.

St George is truly an international saint and shares his patronage with Venice, Genoa, Portugal and Catalonia and several more countries. So far as we know, St George was never anywhere near England. In the middle ages he became the ideal of martial valour and selflessness, bravery and gallantry. He was probably not recognised as England's patron

saint until the reign of Edward III (1327-77) when Edward made him the patron of the newly created Most Noble Order of the Garter.

George was probably chosen by Edward as he believed that George embodied many of the good qualities of the people of England and he was pious and ready to stand up for his beliefs.

So far as I am aware there are no traditional recipes for St George's day, but Nutmeg Egg custard tart is a very old English recipe and extremely delicious.

### EGG CUSTARD TART WITH NUTMEG

### **INGREDIENTS**

For the pastry

8 ounces plain flour(200 grms)

4 ounces cold butter (100 grms)

1 ounce caster sugar (25 grms)

grated nutmeg

1 whole egg or 2 egg yolks plus up to 1 tablespoon cold water

For the custard 300 mls whipping cream (½ pint) 100 mls creamy milk (1/8<sup>th</sup> pint) 2 eggs plus 2 egg yolks 2 ounces caster sugar (50qrms)



### **METHOD**

Grate a generous amount of the nutmeg and add to the flour. Make the pastry by the rubbing in method. If you have a food processor this is easiest.

Refrigerate for a good while or overnight. Roll the pastry and line an 8inch (20cm) loose bottom tin. Put in the fridge for at least 45mins. Line the tin with foil and baking beans.

Heat the oven and a baking tray to 180 Gas 5 and bake the pastry case for about 25 minutes. Remove the foil and beans. Patch up any holes with left over pastry and bake for a little longer, remove then brush with a little beaten egg and bake for 2 minutes. Set aside to cool completely.

Turn down the oven to 120 leaving the baking tray in.

Put the cream and milk into a saucepan and slowly bring to a simmer. Meanwhile whisk the eggs, yolks and sugar in a heatproof bowl. Put the tart shell into the oven and using a jug pour the custard mixture into the shell. Grate nutmeg over the top and bake for 35 – 45 minutes. It is cooked when there is just a faint wobble in the centre. Allow to cool then enjoy on its own or with cooked rhubarb, which should be in season at that time.

**NOTE** If you wish to make a gluten-free version, either make your usual recipe of shortcrust pastry, adding the grated nutmeg or buy ready made. Roll it out, grate a generous amount of nutmeg onto the pastry, fold in half then re-roll. Otherwise make in exactly the same way.


### Help! Plea for Photographs for next Messenger

# What has it been like keeping a small business going in Covid-19 times?

Our architectural practice has eight staff at the moment, a young and enthusiastic bunch who all work in one room. This suits us as there are plenty of opportunities to look over each other's shoulder, to give guidance to less experienced and by listening in to others' phone calls know what's going on across an office with about thirty-five live projects at various stages of development.

I sat with Pete, my fellow director, to think about what was coming two weeks ago and it dawned on us that if we were unable to carry on, produce work and send out bills, the bank account would soon be drained and we would have no money to pay salaries. We urgently sat with everyone and had a long meeting to plan all working from home. A long serious meeting. The younger team members were enthusiastic about new sharing technology to send each other messages and have dial in conference calls. The managers were a little less enthusiastic thinking that it would be easy to lose control of everything, and would people still be motivated sitting at their computers (in pyjamas?) at their kitchen table?

We started on last Friday and dispersed to seven locations all over North Devon. We depended on getting all our documents and drawings from our server in Pilton and our broadband promptly went down. There was then a morning where BT, the IT firm and Broadband supplier argued about whose responsibility it was, until eventually the router was replaced, and we were back able to access things. We decided to start each day with a 'meeting' which was one of those group calls with all of us and not sure who was speaking next. Plenty of technological glitches. Afterwards Pete said to me 'That was awful, we have to get better at that'.

Actually, over the next few days ( seems like months) we have staggered on, drawings have been produced (and bills sent out). What I have learnt about the whole process is that it isn't the technology - we have got slightly better at that - but we miss the sheer positive human contact and communication that working in the same studio helped with. We have to treasure moments like when in our morning meeting we heard a regular thumping noise, and were told it was someone's dog who had come over to join in. Or a photo circulated of Boris Johnson jogging in colourful shorts after he told us that we could all leave home for exercise. We have learnt that you have to try hard to communicate – and pass on encouragement, as it just isn't the same on an email or message. It really is twice as hard to collaborate.

I have also learnt that it's not the staff stopping working that we have to worry about, but the opposite, them carrying on without a break. I don't know what the weeks ahead will bring. The boundaries between home and work have gone - which is good and bad. I guess we are lucky to have an occupation that we can carry on at home. We can't carry on like this for ever, and the pandemic may finish our business yet, but, in the last few weeks' absolute tumult, I have been heartened by how people adapt to this strange state of isolation. I hope that it is not causing you and yours too much suffering and that you can stay safe. This virus has lead to unprecedented changes in all our lives - write in and tell us about how it has affected you, the bad or even the good ways that it has turned life upside down and we will include some responses in the next Messenger.

The Last Call (Two Rivers): Anne Cleeves


I am not sure if you are a fan of detective series such as 'Vera' or 'Shetland'? You may find them entertaining diversions or maybe not be a fan. The creator of these series, Anne Cleeves, has just published a new book, promised to be the start of a series, based on the exploits of Detective Inspector Mathew Venn. What made it interesting as far as I was concerned was that he works from Barnstaple Police station, and the story has as its background the coast towns and landscape of North Devon. The story starts when a body is found on the beach at Crow Point (!), but soon moves to Ilfracombe, Braunton and Barnstaple. It adds something when you can recognise the spots described whether it is Park School (the detective's former school), Barnstaple High Street on a Saturday, or Braunton Burrows and the marsh. It is quite gritty (definitely not Miss Marple) and therefore maybe not to everyone's taste. It is fair to say that whilst extolling the beauty of North Devon, she gives less of a tourist's view but more a contemporary view, weaving in many themes such as how we look after people with learning disabilities as well as the effect of growing up in an extreme religious sect on one of the characters. The plot has many twists and turns, will the team get their culprit in the end? It may just provide a diversion when confined to home, and fun to see if you can recognise the locations. I suspect you will see it on the TV soon, and you can say that you read about it here first.

The latter is only possible because of large earth dams which have been constructed (by earth diggers). These earth dams are made of the existing earth in that area, rather than some imported material and are the size of five football pitches. It was noted that culturally most of the farming is done by the women in Kenya which is why, supposedly, the envelopes this year do appear to feature women on the poster and envelope covers.

Our money goes to the above and to education about farming, irrigation, soil erosion and so on.

We were sad to learn that Jill Stone is leaving Christian Aid after some 19 years of service in total. She explained that she was taking voluntary redundancy along with others, as the charity is in some financial difficulties. She went on to explain that there are funds for specific areas which are matched by government funding but the collections from the general public are way down. The regional centres are all being closed but there will be a new office/hub in a northern city, while the one in the south of England will be closed. Jill said that when she started her job in the south-west some  $2\frac{1}{2}$  years ago she felt that North Devon had rather been forgotten about by the charity and therefore she had made frequent visits, as far as time allowed, to increase communication with the region. Both Margaret Robinson, rep from Braunton and I did thank her very much for her visits in general and for leading this interesting meeting on Sunday.

Thank you very much for Carolyn's help in organisation and with Jo's input on the IT, without which the meeting and link-up simply wouldn't have taken place.

This year the charity's week runs from 10-16 May. Carolyn and I had already placed our annual order and so have bagged up the church's individual requests.
