Act of Worship at Home 13th February 2022

Reading Luke 6 vv 17-26

He came down with them and stood on a level place, with a great crowd of his disciples and a great multitude of people from all Judea, Jerusalem, and the coast of Tyre and Sidon. They had come to hear him and to be healed of their diseases; and those who were troubled with unclean spirits were cured. And all in the crowd were trying to touch him, for power came out from him and healed all of them.

Then he looked up at his disciples and said:

'Blessed are you who are poor,

for yours is the kingdom of God.

'Blessed are you who are hungry now,

for you will be filled.

'Blessed are you who weep now,

for you will laugh.

'Blessed are you when people hate you, and when they exclude you, revile you, and defame you on account of the Son of Man. Rejoice on that day and leap for joy, for surely your reward is great in heaven; for that is what their ancestors did to the prophets.

'But woe to you who are rich,

for you have received your consolation.

Woe to you who are full now,

for you will be hungry.

Woe to you who are laughing now,

for you will mourn and weep.

Woe to you when all speak well of you, for that is what their ancestors did to the false prophets.

Reflection

William Boice once wrote "Dear Lord, I have been re-reading the record of the Rich Young Ruler. But it has set me thinking. No matter how much wealth he had, he couldn't ride in a car, have any surgery, turn on a light, buy penicillin, hear a pipe organ, watch TV, wash dishes in running water, type a letter, mow a lawn, fly in an airplane, sleep on a sprung mattress, or talk on the phone. If he was rich, then what am I?"

There is terrible suffering caused by poverty throughout the world and yet Jesus said, "Blessed are you who are poor, for yours is the kingdom of God." But how can that be? The poor don't appear to be blessed. The hungry don't appear to be blessed. Those who weep don't appear to be blessed. And those who are hated don't appear to be blessed. In fact it seems that the reverse is true. Perhaps the spiritual advantage of poverty is that with absolutely no possessions, the soul is more free to seek God. Most of us with possessions spend a considerable amount of time and energy concerning ourselves about our possessions, hanging on to them, increasing them, improving them. Some choose poverty to be released from all those worries and can use that time and energy to move closer to God. It was Mother Teresa who said, "You'll never know that Jesus is all you need until Jesus is all you have." And she was a woman who knew that possessions tend to cushion us against real life. But I suspect there are very few like Mother Teresa who could choose all the sufferings and hardships poverty brings.

Luke was on the side of the poor. Luke spells out an option for the poor. And Jesus showed in practice what that option was. He showed that the poor, the hungry, those who weep or are hated, those who suffer in any way, are deeply loved by God.

And he did it by showing that, as God's most perfect revelation of his love, he was not only on their side, but wanted them as his friends and wanted to spend time with them.

If that attitude were true of all then perhaps the poor would really be blessed, and know they are blessed. But until that time comes, we need to continue to fight for the poor, for their rights, and to

improve their standard of living. And maybe when we all share more, we shall share in the blessings of the poor offered by God.

But of course in another sense we can all suffer, we can all be poor in different ways, we can all hunger for something, have an emptiness within us, and we can all weep. And Christ knows what it is that makes <u>us</u> poor, that leaves <u>us</u> empty, that makes <u>us</u> weep, and he promises to bless <u>us</u>, to give us more than we can imagine, to fill us to overflowing with his generosity and love, to turn our tears into laughter. Blessed are the poor, thanks be to God. Amen.
