What a joy it was to see the **Sunday Club** children back in church – albeit briefly - on Mothering Sunday. They were very excited about coming in! They had been working quite hard together for three weeks decorating the Mothering Sunday cards and book marks that Maureen and Isabella had prepared. Each of the children, holding tightly on to a basket full of coloured envelopes, walked into the church during the last hymn. They stood in front of the congregation in a line proudly waiting for the cards they were displaying to be collected by everyone there. The envelopes were soon gone! We hope everyone found and enjoyed the Fairtrade chocolate heart that had been popped into each envelope! We were able also to include a card (but sadly, no chocolate) in time for the Worship at Home Mothering Sunday post – one of the many postings that Don and Eddy have so faithfully been sending out every fortnight. We also had time on that day to talk with the children about Mothering Sunday. A chance question - 'Why do we have a special Sunday to remember our mothers - we see them every day! - led to talking together about the origins of Mothering Sunday and its connection with the church. But we finished our time together with filling little Easter baskets with chocolates to give to our mums. Other Sundays have included the story of Mary Magdalene showing her thanks by anointing Jesus' feet with precious oil and also of course most recently Palm Sunday when the children again visited the church to distribute the palms. Hopefully we are going to be able to have our own version of communion on Easter Day (we have been in church on previous occasions), as well as our Happy Easter story and refreshments. No doubt with lots of chocolate!!

Our April Café Church fell on Palm Sunday. The highlight was a procession round the church during the worship time, having first heard the story of Jesus riding into Jerusalem on a donkey to the shouts of Hosanna – all thanks to Alison. The children spread their cloaks on the ground and then went off singing Hosanna to the accompaniment of our rousing band. Up the stairs they went, following the donkey, and round the balcony – a real treat - all the time waving their palms, some they had made earlier and some bamboo fronds from Eff's garden! As well as donkey ears head dresses and making paper palms, the many activities included making chocolate cornflake Easter nests, marvelously engineered at each table by Nicola - with very chocolatey faces afterwards to prove it! The tea was as delicious as ever, again served individually for Covid safety, and the evening ended with a mad game of Duck Duck Goose in the Alan Finch Room to use up that surplus energy. The afternoon had been as enjoyable as ever.

Parents and Toddlers has been happy to welcome two new families this past term. But we would still love to have more. Tables were laid out in the church and as each child arrived they were given a tray very colourfully laid out with all the necessary ingredients for each recipe. Claire then led the children through the different stages of the recipes helping them with the skills involved like safely

cutting and chopping and beating the ingredients – and even showing the older ones how to make sugar carrot decorations for their carrot cakes. The church was an ideal venue with its space and Claire and Rosemary were very appreciative of the kitchen and its facilities. The day was filled with the sound of very happy children's chat and busyness, and there was a great atmosphere there. They all loved our premises and we loved them. We hope that this will be the first of many visits.

News from Amigos and Kira Farm

We have encouraging news from Richard Kidega, our sponsored trainee on Kira Farm. He seems to be settling in well and learning new ways of growing his crops. As a result he is gaining the knowledge which will be so beneficial to his two extended families when he gets back home to his huge plot of more than 50 acres. His second letter...

The First Rains Have Come (Late news - the rains as yet are intermittent)

Dear Anthea and Tony and Friends at Christ Church,

I am very happy for this chance to write this letter to you. I greet all the people at your church and the youth there but also in your family. Thank you for writing back to me and also telling me about yourself and what you do. In Uganda, I would call you 'Jajja'. Have you heard of that in England?

This month at Kira I have been doing some agriculture activities. We are learning conservation farming through Farming God's Way whereby I have learnt it doesn't require a lot of technology and I hope to will learn more as I practice. I have so far planted maize and beans in furrows and maize in rows. I have also learnt about good spacing of crops which I have applied in my garden. Spacing enables me to weed easily and it makes the crops to grow freely without having to fight for nutrients but also mulching which prevents soil erosion while keeping the soil moist at all the time. In Kitgum, we never do such, so it is all new to me – but I am learning.

I have decided to take building and carpentry on the other side of training as my main courses, and so I have learnt how to make T -joints and taking measurements for tables, chairs, beds, this is all in carpentry.

When Tim (CEO) and his wife visited last month, everywhere they went people everywhere were telling them the difference clean water has made to their lives. To quote from his letter: 'It launches them into new possibilities as it promotes more time for other activities, gender equality, and healthier and stronger lives to start new endeavours'. A bore hole also promotes safety for women... 'since having a borehole women can now leave their home, get water, and return in less than one hour. The incidence of domestic violence has greatly reduced and more time is saved to perform other family duties."

Beekeeping can help communities flourish

The second piece of good news follows on the little story I added at the end of last month's news update about the brilliant idea of using beehives as fences to stop the elephants destroying their crops.. The Kigaragara groups, right next to Murchison Falls National Park want to do this and it seems there is now the possibility of this... The communities in Gulu and Masindi have presented future plans including requesting assistance to run their own beekeeping projects to generate honey businesses, increase crop pollination and conserve their forests'.

Our Prayers

We give thanks for all that Amigos is achieving in Uganda on Kira Farm, in the Child Sponsorship programme and with Community Development in the Farming Communities. We give special thanks this month for the life-giving clean water that is now available in all their communities, the opportunities being given to generate honey businesses to help communities flourish, and for the food packs that were taken to the sponsored families when their supplies were running very low. We pray now for good rains to come to allow the crops to grow healthily and to produce a good harvest, for God's provision for the guardians of the sponsored children, especially for the provision of food, and at this Eastertide that all Amigos' participants will experience the tangible and transforming love of God. Our thoughts are especially with Richard.

A winning weekend in Cheltenham.

After a 2-year enforced break from contesting due to Covid and rescheduling and relocation of the West of England championships from Torquay to Cheltenham, Chris and I, set off with Bideford Town Band to perform early the next morning at Cheltenham race course. After a quick warm up in a freezing village hall at 7.40am on Saturday we drove to the racecourse and took to the stage about 9.30 to perform our rendition of the 4th section test-piece, Argos. We were fortunate that only one player had tested positive during the week and Chris was tasked with playing a hybrid part covering his own euphonium music and the vital parts of the first baritone part to cover the gap. It was my first outing on tenor horn having moved from tuned percussion when we restarted rehearsals last summer.

We played well with of course the usual little slips and trips that always occur with nerves and adrenaline, but our MD was thrilled with our performance and in tears as he told us it was the best we had ever played. Then came the long wait as the remaining bands – 11 in total – took to the stage. Just before noon the results were ready and we returned to the auditorium with bated breath. Rather than starting from 11th place the results began at 6^{th} and when 6^{th} , 5^{th} , 4^{th} 3^{rd} and 2^{nd} had been announced we were feeling rather deflated thinking we must have come in the bottom five. Suddenly the winners were given as the band that played 3^{rd} – Bideford Town Band. That was us!! We rose from our seats as one and whooped with delight and disbelief.

The winner's trophy and banner were presented to us along with a cheque for £200. Almost more importantly we received an invitation to the National finals in September this year and it is almost certain that we will be promoted to the 3^{rd} section for 2023. What a day! We are still on cloud 9 and raring to get started on the new test piece when it is announced. We were so delighted that our hard work and commitment had brought us such a reward and that we had achieved it as a team both of musicians and friends. We did it for each other and our conductor and came away with the prize. It was a day we will never forget.

Janet and Chris Marshall



JOAN OF ARC (THE MAID OF ORLEANS)

Joan of Arc is considered a heroine of France for her role in the Lancastrian phase of the 100 Years War.

Joan was born in Domrémy, the daughter of a peasant farmer. Joan was a pious girl brought up during the Hundred Years War. Joan was fourteen when she first heard her 'voices'. These she identified as belonging to Michael, Catherine of Alexandria and Margaret of Antioch; the voices told her to save France.

Although an intelligent girl, she was illiterate and knew nothing of military strategy. At that time the situation seemed hopeless, and she met with no success in persuading the commander of the French forces, but her voices persisted. Her credibility increased when some predictions and prophecy of further defeat were fulfilled. Eventually she was sent to the Dauphin (later Charles VII), who was impressed with her recognising him, even in disguise. Legend has it that she gave some secret sign (never disclosed) which verified the supernatural nature of her message. Joan was then mentally examined by theologians at Poitiers for three weeks. They found nothing amiss so advised the Dauphin to make good use of her abilities. Her advice to the military resulted in many victories; she went into battle with the men, wearing white armour. At one time she was wounded in the breast but this only enhanced her reputation.

In the July of that year the Dauphin was crowned at Rheims with Joan at his side with her standard. This completed her mission; her voices had warned her that she would not live very long. She found it difficult to withdraw at the moment of her success, even though she had become the object of

suspicion, jealousy and misunderstanding.

An attack on Paris failed, followed by her relief of Compiegne; she led a sortie from the gates but was captured and imprisoned by the Duke of Burgundy. Charles made no attempt to save her and she was sold to the English. Her success in battle was attributed to witchcraft and spells. Joan was examined several times, but her lack of education and theological knowledge meant that the judges declared her visions were false and diabolical. The summary of her statement was also condemned by the University of Paris. If she refused to recant she would be handed over to the secular arm for punishment as a recalcitrant heretic. She was declared a lapsed heretic and burnt at the market place in Rouen on 30th May. Joan died with fortitude, looking at the cross and calling the name of Jesus. Her ashes were then thrown into the Seine.

About twenty years later Joan's family asked for the case to be re-opened, the verdict was quashed and she was pronounced innocent. In England there were many churches named after her. In Winchester Cathedral there is a statue of her opposite Cardinal Beaufort who took part in her condemnation.

BRITTANY BUTTER BISCUITS (Makes approximately 10 biscuits)

Ingredients
3 egg yolks
Half tbsp. milk
125g plain flour
85g caster sugar
100g butter at room temperature cut into small pieces
Small drop of vanilla essence

Method

- Pre-heat the oven to 160°C fan, Gas 4
- Lightly butter or line a large baking tray
- Beat the egg and the milk; reserve half a tbsp. for glaze
- Sift the flour into a bowl and make a well in the centre
- Add the eggs, sugar, vanilla and butter, work together with your hands; this will form slightly sticky dough. If you have time, cool for a while in the fridge, wrapped in cling film
- When firmer, roll out dough to 1/3rd inch thick and cut out circles using 3 inch cutter
- Transfer to baking sheet, score to create a lattice pattern and brush with the egg mixture
- Bake for 10 12 minutes until golden, transfer to a wire rack to cool completely.
