### Dear Friends,

the second of two pastoral letters – I have been asked by the elders to write the minister's letter for August Messenger and I guess many of you are eagerly anticipating Rev Don's return from sabbatical.

One of the verses of a song I can remember from Sunday School days goes like this:

*Little drops of water, little grains of sand, Make the mighty ocean and the beauteous land.* (Mrs J.A. Carney 1845)

I like to think of that when I'm down walking on the beach or at the seaside. It is said that the planet earth should not really be called that as about **71 percent** of the Earth's surface is water-covered, and the oceans hold about 96.5 percent of all Earth's water. I guess that calculation might not have been well known in 1845.

Along with all the other energy bills which I receive comes a little newsletter from South West Water telling us how they 'bring water to life' and support the lives of people and the places they love for generations to come.

If you were cast off on to a desert island and had no equipment the first thing you should look for is fresh water. You can survive for three weeks without food but only for about three (or even four) days without water.

Jesus had some encounters at the local village wells because everyone went there to get their daily supply of water. Conversations happened and people passed on news and information. An important job for the women was making sure that huge jars of water were kept full at their home. No pipework or running taps or showers.

This might make us think a little more about the water we do use. We rarely have flash floods although some did occur in Barnstaple two summers ago. Then we are even more aware of the structures which are in place to alleviate rare occurrences of flooding.

Living in a tourist area we are more aware of how much water can be harnessed to provide leisure spots- the reservoirs, lakes and beaches where people flock on warm summer days. A regional environmental improvement plan to keep us safe and healthy is important. Simple pleasures like turning a tap on and filling a kettle making a cup of tea is something we take for granted.

Yet in this world of God's creation there are many people who live with unhealthy water supplies, who suffer from increasing flash flooding and have no spare water. This 71% of the make up of our planet is surely a wondrous thing.

Water Aid is a charity which we have recently supported at Christ Church. It was officially established on 21 July 1981. Their first projects start in Zambia and Sri Lanka. Since then they have gone on to supply 28 million people with clean water which 1 in 10 never have.

We can spend the proverbial forty years wandering in strange deserts, sinking unrewarding wells and moving on, driven by our thirst, but when we stop still long enough to look inside ourselves, really look beyond our ideas about water and what and where it should be, we discover it was with us all the time, that quiet clear pool which is ageless, the meaning of our existence and the answer to all wanderings.

And as we drink, we know what Jesus meant when he said we'd never be thirsty again.

Not only did we hear the story told as engagingly as ever by Joan, but to follow up, Alison talked a little with the children about Living with Sight Loss and also introduced the children to braille. Not only did she have some children's books in braille from the library for them to experience the feel and touch of braille but also some spectacles from 'see hear' which show wearers what it is like to have certain eye conditions. The children were quite fascinated by what she shared. The activities reflected the Bible story with word searches and table puzzles as well as the theme of sight loss. Each family was given a copy of the braille alphabet with the suggestion to write their name using it by colouring in the appropriately positioned dots of the alphabet. But the most popular activity was 'the touchy – feely challenge'! This was identifying the objects hidden in bags. There were such wonderful faces of concentration as the children endeavoured to work out what was in each bag! As usual we all had a jolly good sing, the Hallelu Hallelu Hallelu Hallelujah, we'll praise the Lord causing much laughter with its (not so) well- timed energetic alternate standing and sitting!! Other favourites included 'Give me Joy in my Heart' and 'We shall go out with joy'. # A Challenge – Sunday morning service.

In last month's Messenger there was a wonderful list of all the ways that people who are not able to come to Christ Church can engage in worship with other people. Missing from the list was the excellent Radio Devon Service at 8am on Sunday morning and I wondered why. Then I read an article by Mervyn Kerswell in Jubilate - the magazine for the group of churches in the north of the Circuit. I have his permission to use it here.

These services have now ceased due to a "management" decision at Radio Devon that they are no longer needed as the Covid problem has gone away and that their audience no longer needs the service! How misguided is that!! I have spoken to one of their producers who told me that the only way they will resurrect the morning radio service is if their audience telephone them and complain about its absence. So it's up to you! The more calls they receive the more likely it will be reinstated.

We have lodged our protest, but it needs more than US. If you would like it back please telephone 01752 ~ 260323 voicing your protest. If everyone leaves it to others NOTHING will happen and the service will be lost for good. It's up to you!! Ring or lose it!!

(At the moment there is an alternative West Country service, but it is sometimes difficult to tune into. Radio Cornwall (frequency FM 95.2/ 96.0/or 103.9 MHz) have a more sympathetic management and are continuing their Sunday morning service at 8.00 am.)

# SAINT CLARE OF ASSISI

Clare was born on 16 July 1194; she died on 11<sup>th</sup> August 1253. Clare is the patron saint of laundry; goldsmiths; bicycle messengers and believe it or not, has recently been made patron saint of television.

Clare was born in Assisi of wealthy parents, unusually for the time she was taught to read and write, in addition to learning domestic skills. Clare was considered beautiful in both body and soul and the pride of her family. Although we do not know for sure, it was assumed that girls of her rank would be groomed for marriage. For Clare the choices available to her as a young woman were not enough for her, she considered that there must be something else out there for her. This she discovered was the teachings of Jesus. One day about aged 12 she snuck away to listen to Francis of Assisi, a well-known local man. Clare was inspired by these words from Francis:

"When the world has knocked down the door to your peace, quickly go inside and remember God. When the world is tempting you to seek physical comforts, sit down and feel the real comfort we have as the life of a brother. When something becomes more important than God, repeat your prayer "God give me a life that is simple and true. God give me a life that is simple and true"

On hearing these words she thought such a life worth living must be a real adventure. Clare was several years younger than Francis but beyond her youthful enthusiasm Francis detected her true spirit. He felt their souls had a common destiny. Clare felt that she had no choice but to live and be like Francis, any other way would not be listening to the voice of God within. Clare and her sister Agnes left home to follow Francis, apparently there was uproar and her parents and several soldiers chased after her. The soldiers grabbed them and tried to carry them home. Clare's strength was suddenly as a thousand angels and her weight was as a mountain. Word quickly went round Assisi that Clare and her sister were great souls.

Clare longed for the simple life of Christ as described by Francis and his guide to devotion and sacrificing the self to the fire of the soul. Clare reasoned that sacrifice is only the clearing away of everything that is not true. Her life of love; sacrifice and devotion had begun. Clare asked Francis to help her dedicate her life to God. Clare took vows on 20th March 1212. This marked the beginning of the second order of Saint Francis.

Clare soon became the Abbess of San Damiano and many others joined her. Most of her time was spent in manual labour and prayer. Clare began using any of her spare time in changing the governing rules established by the pope, to the newly established Franciscan rule. Her request was finally approved three days before she died. The order became known for its life of abject poverty and committed life of prayer. It is considered that due to prayer Clare was able to save Assisi on two occasions. The first involved Clare raising the host up in a window, thereby causing Frederick II's invading troops to fall back. The second: when Assisi was again under attack, Clare and her nuns prayed for the safety of their town, whereby a storm swept in and scattered the attackers.

Clare cared for Francis at the end of his life and was present at his death. Despite ill-health Clare continued to promote the growth of her order. Clare was canonized in 1255. Today the order numbers more than 20,000 sisters worldwide with more than 70 countries represented.

# HOLIER THAN THOU CHOCOLATE CAKE

# Ingredients

4 ounces (100g) wholemeal flour

2 ounces (50g) cocoa powder

1.5 tsp baking powder

2 free range eggs

1tbsp honey

1tsp vanilla essence



4 ounces (100g) pitted prunes or dates, cooked and mashed 8 ounces (200g) cooked grated or blasted beetroot

5 fluid ounces (125ml) good quality vegetable or olive oil Method

Sift dry ingredients into a bowl. Mix the rest of the ingredients together, if you have a food processor or hand-held blender then blast them together, if not give a good mix.

Turn into a prepared tin (6" for a deepish cake, 7" for a shallower one. Cook at gas 4, Electric 160 for about 30 mins. If it needs longer you may have to cover the top with brown paper. It is ready when a sharp knife or skewer comes out clean.

# Optional coating

4 ounces good quality Fairtrade chocolate and 2 ounces (50g) butter

Break up chocolate into a basin, cut butter in pieces into the basin, melt together over a bowl of boiling water. Remove basin from the heat when melted and allow to cool until beginning to thicken, then spread over the cake.

This makes a very moist, scrummy and apparently rich fudge-like cake, so you will only need to give small pieces to guests.

Although it contains no sugar, if giving to a friend with diabetes remember they should have a <u>very</u> small piece as a treat as it still contains carbs and sugar from the beet, prunes and honey.

I had a job deciding what to make to go with St Clare, nothing seemed to work. Then I remembered a cake I had done a recipe for a few years ago as an antidote to Death by Chocolate cake. 'Holier than Thou chocolate cake.' No added sugar and reasonably wholesome. It does not really need the chocolate coating but looks better in the photograph. Enjoy. Music to listen to:

How I remember making gifts in Sunday Club to sell in the vestibule to the church family; our big raffle; a 24 hour sponsored table tennis marathon; a Ceilidh with wonderful live music from the Oggle Band and delicious food too. We raised the money for the visits. The same year we sponsored a Kira Farm student called Roland Owera. Since then, inspired by both Hannah's and then Maisie's stories and experience from Kira Farm, Christ Church has continued to support a Kira Farm student each year, playing a part in setting them and those around them on their way to hopeful futures.

Our present student is Richard who we hear is a self-confident young man who laughs a lot and spreads joy around the people he is with. He is anxious to learn the skills to fully utilise his land profitably in order to support his and his father's families. He also dearly wishes to fulfil his dream of becoming an engineer. What better place for him to learn the necessary skills - and more always so grateful...

And oh the joy of a mattress...

'How are you doing my dear sponsors?

Let me hope everything is well with you and your families. I am also fine here in Uganda.

Two days ago they gave us new mattresses. to tell you the truth, I had never slept on a new mattress. I have been sleeping like a baby. I am happy to inform you that I can now make all joints in the carpentry training. At the moment together with my friends, we are making some tables and chairs for the Kira office. It is a good project to be working on as a team and it teaches me how to work together with others.

More interesting, I am happy that I am learning about computers. I never thought I would ever be able to learn computers. The only place is in the next district which is 4 to 5 hours away from my place, which is very far and I can't afford the school fees there

I am no longer scared about not being able to use a computer, we have a very patient trainer who is helping us learn, we are very slow but our trainer never gets tired. I know by the end of my year of training I will be able to use the computer very well.

# **Tearfund Action**

During this turbulent time in politics, we are reminded by Tearfund that the climate crisis isn't going away. The interruption in the political timetable caused by the leadership situation will possibly delay action on this urgent issue.

We are asked to pray:

- for peace, wisdom, integrity and unity for our political leaders
- for the UK Government to be a force for good, that they will respond to those most affected by the climate crisis and make decisions that care for, not harm, God's creation
- that climate finance promises will be fulfilled
- that those living in poverty will have access to the finance and solutions they need to help them respond to the climate crisis

- sign the Tearfund petition calling on the UK Government to influence other wealthy nations to deliver the \$100 billion of climate finance they promised from 2020. They will be handing this petition to the new prime minister in the run-up to COP 27 in November
