

Dear Friends,

Trying, today, to type this message for the April edition of The Messenger I am conscious of the date. As I sit at my computer, it's the 14th February. So, it's St Valentine's Day and, this year, is on the same day as Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent. In the last century this only happened in 1923, 1934 and 1945. In this century it will occur once more in 2029. This begs the question, 'does it matter?'

By tradition, St Valentine's Day is about letting people know they are loved. What then of Ash Wednesday? Well, I believe that Lent, in every year since Jesus began His mission and ministry, is about two aspects of love. The first is recognising that God so loved, and still loves, each of us that He sent Jesus to live among us. By living among us Jesus experienced our temptations, trials, pain and suffering. Yet, more than that, Jesus underwent temptations for 40 days and nights to show He, and only He, could defeat Satan to give us the remedy to sin and failure (see Hebrews Ch 4 vs 14 to 16). The other aspect of love, to be found in Lent, is our endeavour – often unsuccessfully – to follow Jesus' example of fasting and discipline throughout Lent, because we recognise Jesus' love for us and try to show our love for Him, by fasting or seeking to follow Him more closely.

When you read this in April, Easter Day, on 31st March, will be past. The Gospel reading for the 7th April (the first Sunday after Easter) is about two of the resurrection appearances of Jesus to the disciples gathered in the upper room. Thomas wasn't present to witness the first appearance and refused to believe the others, when they told him they'd seen the risen Jesus. A week later Thomas was there when Jesus appeared again. Jesus invited Thomas to put his fingers into the holes in Jesus' hands and put his hand into the hole in Jesus' side. What is so important is that Jesus didn't condemn Thomas; nor does Jesus exclude Thomas from being an apostle because he doubted. Jesus simply said, 'Stop doubting and believe.' Indeed, if you read all the resurrection appearances, in all four gospels, you'll find many times that the disciples and Apostles doubted what their eyes saw and beheld. Like Jesus did with Peter, in John Ch 21, He acknowledged their faults, failings and doubts, and loved them and forgave them anyway. Importantly, He used them to be His witnesses to the world, despite their failures. He calls each of us too, despite the sense of failure that many of us feel.

For each of us, the message from Jesus is the same. I know you; I love you; I died for you. But, says Jesus, I rose again to bring you new life and the promise of eternal life. This is the real joy of the Easter Story we've just celebrated, and can continue to celebrate. No matter who or what we are, or what we have done, if we honestly confess our sin and seek to follow Jesus, He will always love us, even if we have been made to feel a sense of abiding failure by other people. As Jesus says in John's Gospel Ch 6 and vs 37 'Who ever comes to me I will never turn away.' (cont.) May the knowledge of the risen Jesus, who loves each one of us, fill you with His peace and joy and the knowledge that you are dearly loved and precious to the Lord, now and always.

We ask that, through the loving eyes of Jesus, we may see others and ourself as you see us: children of the living loving God who saves us through the merit of Jesus Christ, your Son, our resurrected living Saviour. Christian Aid Week 2024 - 12-18 May

Seven days, so many ways to make a difference.

Every Christian Aid Week, people across Britain and Ireland raise funds, act and pray for their global neighbours in a celebration of hope for a fairer world.

This year's appeal runs from 12–18 May and is focussing on the organisation's work in Burundi, one of the most densely populated and poorest countries in Africa. Heavily reliant on agriculture, it's also one of the least prepared to combat the effects of climate change, including droughts, floods and landslides. The global cost of living crisis has intensified the challenges: more than 70 per cent of the population live in poverty and more than half of children are chronically malnourished.

Christian Aid has been working in Burundi since 1995 when it first offered humanitarian assistance to people surviving the civil conflict. Now, alongside local partners, the organisation helps establish Village Savings and Loans Associations (VSLAs). These community-led groups mean people can save and borrow money, making small businesses possible, offering reliable and diverse incomes so families can eat regularly, get medicine when they need it, and build safer homes.


Thirty-five-year-old Aline Nibogora is the chairperson of a VSLA which supports some 25 families in a remote village, in Makamba Province. Aline escaped an abusive marriage only to find herself on the streets begging for a place to stay.

Her life changed when she went to a three-day, Christian Aid-funded community workshop. With a small start-up loan, Aline began trading avocados and peanuts locally. She's now a grocery wholesaler and living on her own plot of land where she's building a home for her family. In the next five years she hopes to expand, so one day she can buy a mill. This will provide a source of income without the need to transport heavy goods over long distances.

"I don't want my children to have a painful life like mine, remembering it makes me weep. I could never have dreamed I would one day have a brick house and be a successful businesswoman, able to feed and clothe my children. This is a plan and I will do it; I am a woman who is an achiever."

Stained glass repairs - can you help?

News from Kenya - continued from March.....

Once the new biology lab had been built, it was decorated, storage cupboards built, new desks and benches installed and equipment moved in. Everyone was very pleased with the result. New water tanks were installed to supply the lab and the pump installed is working well.

A very dramatic event happened when a bus full of F1 student refugees arrived at the school from a camp on the Kenya/Sudan border a few hundred miles to the north. Many of the students do not know who their parents are, or even if they are alive. It is believed that many of them are orphans. They had been sent to the school by the Jomo Kenyatta Foundation who will



pay for their education. Each of the girls arrived with brand new items such as mattresses, buckets, shoes, clothes and personal effects so they are well provided for. However, consternation was created when it was found that none of them had any underwear....it is so hot in Turkana that as little clothing as possible is worn! They were welcomed into the school and the other students are wonderfully supportive and they settled well.

A farewell meal for Richard was prepared by F3 students. They baked wonderful cakes, made delicious salads to go with the chicken, rice and chapatti from the school kitchen. There were lots of speeches, photos and goodbyes before Richard was able to finally get into the car and set off for Kisumu airport, where there was just time for tea and more farewell cake before checking in for the flight.


Amigos and Kira Farm

We have heard from Kira Farm that Gloria is thriving and enjoying learning skills Life there is apparently buzzing with energy, with the warm weather of this season adding to the vibrant atmosphere (sounds great!). How is life taking you all over there. From my side things are now moving well due to your grate support on me. I would like to appreciate you all for making me to stay at Kira (KFDC). While at Kira I am learning a lot of things like Hairdressing, Farming, Medicinal and Tailoring as my best course. Not only that but I am also learning more about cultural and traditional practices.

I am very happy because I came to KFDC when I don't know how to stitch but now I can do stitching and I have a hope that by the end of this year I would be the best in tailoring as my lovely course.

Staying at KFDC is also amazing because we are knowing each and everythins that makes life better.

ABOUT my studies, I stopped in p.7 and I dropped out of school because my mother was not able to pay my secondary level. My father died while I was only two years young. I would like to take this time to appreciate you for surrendering what you all have and sponsors for me. I pray that God should bless you all, and everythings you will be doing should be blessed.

LOIS AND EUNICE (Mother and Grandmother of Timothy)

I find the mention of Lois and Eunice in the bible interesting and significant, perhaps because I am a mother and grandmother myself.

"I have been reminded of your sincere faith, which first lived in your grandmother Lois and in your mother Eunice and, I am persuaded, now lives in you also."

They are mentioned by Paul in 2 Timothy 1 v 5. They are not praised for acts of martyrdom, great sacrifice or oratory skills but for their steadfastness in keeping the faith. Little is known of either woman, we know that Eunice was a Jew who had converted to Christianity, her husband was a Greek who did not support her Christian faith. Lois was probably a widow who lived with her daughter or daughter-in-law, she was also a Christian. It is not difficult to imagine that the easiest way of keeping family harmony would have been to keep their faith silently, but instead they chose to instill Christian values into their son and grandson.

Following the example of his mother and grandmother Timothy became a believer. He was very devout and was discipled by Paul in the faith. It is possible the Paul was a friend of the family and considered Timothy his spiritual son.

In Proverbs 22 v 6 it states "Start children off the way they should go, and even when they are old they will not turn from it." This is as true today as in Old Testament times. Lois and Eunice would have been familiar with Old Testament teachings and were able to apply their knowledge to their Christian faith. The inclusion of them by Paul is important as he is acknowledging the relevance of the feminine influence. In biblical times, as is still largely true to this day, women usually have the day to day care in the early years and the opportunity for them to instill good or "God" values in a child cannot be overestimated.

The two women were acknowledged for their faithfulness and serve as a good example of the way in which it is possible to influence the young. Not of course by indoctrination, but by following the example of Jesus in all we do. Whether or not we are mothers or grandmothers, God places us in positions in families and societies where we can follow the Christian life and be an example to others if we so choose.

HOT CROSS BUNS (photo - page 20)

<u>Ingredients</u>				
1lb (450g) strong plain flour				
2 level tsp easy blend yeast, or two packets of 7g each				
1/4 pint of tepid milk				
1/2 level tsp ground mixed spice	1/2 level tsp cinnamon			
1/2 level tsp ground nutmeg	2 oz (50g) caster sugar			
3 oz (75g) butter	2 free range eggs			
6 oz (150g) mixed dried fruit	1 level tsp salt			
For the glaze				

4 tbsp (60ml) milk and water

3 tbsp caster sugar

<u>Method</u>

1. Sift the dry ingredients into a large mixing bowl.

2. Rub the butter into the flour mixture. Add the sugar

3. Beat the eggs with the warm milk and add to the dry ingredients, together with the fruit

4. Knead until the sides of the bowl are clean, if you have a mixer with a fixed head beater and dough hook this is ideal to use

5. Brush the top lightly with oil, cover and leave in a warm place to double in size. This is quite a rich mixture so may take a while

6. When the dough is risen, gently knock back, cut into 12 pieces, shape into a round and place on an oiled baking sheet

7. Carefully brush with oil, cover with polythene and put in a warm place to double in size

8. There are several ways to mark the cross, simply cutting a cross shape with a sharp knife, use strips of shortcrust pastry, or make a water and flour paste and pipe a cross on the top

9. Place in a fairly hot oven, Fan 190 / Gas 6 for about 15 minutes

10. Brush the top of the buns with the glaze and leave to cool. To make the glaze, gently heat the liquid and sugar until dissolved then rapidly boil until thick and shiny looking.
