Message from Mrs Paula Littlewood

Dear Friends,

Sunday 1st December brings with it the beginning of Advent and all the excitement that Christmas brings for children and adults like me who have never grown up! However, Christmas is loud, isn't it with so much expectation and that brings with it pressure that many find hard to bear, especially if facing Christmas on their own.

The Methodist Church's Christmas campaign for 2024 is called <u>"Hush the Noise"</u>

which are words from the carol "*It came upon the midnight clear*". This is an invitation to hush the noise and to listen for the love song that the angels bring and are inviting us to sing. The hope is that churches throughout our Circuit will use these resources which cover the period throughout Advent, Christmas and up to Epiphany.

The Church of England is adopting a similar theme which is <u>"Follow the Star: Calm and Bright"</u>

and which draws on another well-known carol, "Silent Night." The focus is on how to find calm during Advent, with reflections offering people a chance to pause and prepare for calmness during the busy season. Then from Christmas Day to Epiphany the focus will be on "bright".

I really like the way both these Churches are focussing on concepts of quiet and calmness so we can listen for the gentle breathing and cry of the baby, Jesus, and share in the joy of his birth with his parents, the shepherds and angels. If you really want to 'Step into the Story', then you need only to turn to the

URC family Advent resource pack

which is particularly aimed at children.

All these resources are easy to find on the internet but, if you need help accessing them, then just ask one of the elders or me and we can help you find them. I wish you a peaceful Advent, joy at Christmas and the mysticism that is in Epiphany as you follow the Star into 2025.

I leave you with the opening liturgy from the Methodist Church's campaign to "Hush the Noise":

Advent dawns with lights strung high and music everywhere, Sights and smells abound around, Senses assaulted and confused,

> *O hush the noise, Let's hear the angels sing. Amid the lists and cards and gifts, Amid the pleas and "please can we", Amid the chaos of the world, O hush the noise, Let's hear the angels sing.*


Christmas Trees!

Notes from the Elders meeting on 4th November 2024

- Reverend Marilyn Tricker opened the Zoom meeting with a prayer.
- Minutes of the last meeting were approved.
- News of the fellowship was shared.
- Safeguarding issue regarding the need to have the front door monitored at all times when the church is open was discussed.
- Election of Elders Process in hand for the election of Elders at the Annual Church Meeting on the 17th November.
- Community Links the need to restart Community Links meetings was discussed and a further discussion was had regarding the idea of approaching previous providers of grants for future funding.
- The fund raising for the emergency lights is progressing but more money is still required to pay for this work.

A message from Christian Aid



No room for comfort and joy... when you've left everything behind to survive.

In South Sudan, Shede and thousands like her are fending off hunger and malnutrition in Wedweil Refugee Settlement.

With very little to call their own, comfort and joy can seem far from their day-to-day reality.

Shede: `I did not come with anything. No table, no teapot, no chair, no bed. Nothing.'

It wasn't just belongings that Shede lost as she fled the conflict in Sudan, her brothers were killed and she's unable to contact her husband. Now she tries to make a temporary shelter feel like a home for her young children, but it's hard: 'I need clean clothes, a bed and a blanket.'

Could you support someone like Shede to buy food and supplies that will protect their family from hunger and malnutrition?

£15 could buy the blanket that brings comfort to a child who is far from home.

£40 could fund the cooking pots that would mean someone could prepare meals and make a living.

Will you help share comfort and joy this Christmas? There will be envelopes available in the foyer should you wish to donate to Christian Aid this Christmas. This is not Christ Church's nominated charity this year but if you feel moved to help people like Shede in addition to your other giving please place your gift in one of the Christian Aid envelopes and put it into the Sunday offertory plate and it will find its way to me. Young Families Work News

Café Church and 'Something More'...

Remembrance Sunday this year brought with it, not only the thoughts, emotions and gratitude always inextricably linked with it, but also the longing and hope for peace. So it followed, that Peace became the theme for November's Café Church – Peace and Reconciliation. Little did we think



that we were going to have the opportunity to hear firsthand from two people who have been working towards Peace and Reconciliation with a charity in Northern Ireland...

...We were blessed with the help and knowledge of Kathy's house visitors - Dave and Sheila Masters - her brother and sister-in-law. They brought with them their experience of working for many years with and for the Crossfire Trust in South Armagh, Northern Ireland. The Trust - a registered charity - was started in 1984 "to make God's love real to people". Still continuing to thrive and develop it cares for the physical, emotional and spiritual needs of people mainly in South Armagh. The initiative was originally started in a simple way some years earlier in 1978 when Ian Bothwell, fresh from Bible College, headed to Crossmaglen in South Armagh in response to watching a TV documentary about the troubles in Northern Ireland when they were at their height. Through practical action, talking with people and bringing them together in a number of ways, Ian sought with others, to restore hope, to explore major peace and reconciliation issues, to address sectarianism and racism and to remind people of God and his love for them all - not as Protestants or Catholics, just Christians. Based in Darkley House since 1986 the Trust has provided supported accommodation for people in housing crisis or who are experiencing homelessness for whatever reason. In addition, it continues to offer benefits and housing advice and a wide range of services to the community, including furniture, clothing, food and counselling. Now, more recently, another centre has opened in Crossmaglen - Something More - a vision of 20 years coming to fruition, which offers a café and drop in centre, a food bank, and a clothing store, with yet more plans to develop it further – another place of Peace and Reconciliation.

As people arrived at Café Church, thanks to Dave and Sheila, they found on each table a Crossfire Wordsearch and a Logo to colour in, accompanied by the word Peace. Everyone was then invited to go to the activity table and assemble a cut-out meal before the worship and story time. This was to emphasize the importance of sitting down, eating and talking together, and making friends – in the way we do every month at Café Church. We were to find out later how particularly relevant this is to the sort of project we were to hear about - an important step towards the building up of peace between people. Other activities at Café Church included decorating – and eating(!) - shortbread hands, highlighting the need for us all to join hands with others here and around the world in order to work together for peace; and also tackling the intricacies of making friendship bracelets! The poppies and their meaning for Remembrance Day were not forgotten. In her introduction to the worship, Alison talked about the significance of both red and white ones. We heard then about the Crossfire Project from Dave and Sheila. The children remained very quiet during this time, joining in afterwards with Make me a Channel of Your

Peace. But then came the final song, Give me Joy (Peace) in my Heart which gave them the opportunity to make a very noisy and joyful sound with the percussion instruments!

Thank you so much to Dave and Sheila for sharing their story – so good to have the opportunity of hearing about peace and reconciliation work from those involved. They will be returning to Northern Ireland in the near future where they will be able to continue working with the Crossfire Trust, but now as volunteers. And thank you so much to everyone for another lovely Café Church – and to Eff for yet more apple crumble! For more information visit <u>www.crossfiretrust.net</u>

<u>On Monday 14th</u> October a large group enjoyed a well presented and illuminating talk by two representatives from Barclays Bank. Some of us just did not realise the extent to which the scammers go to groom innocent members of the public. We were made aware that the scams are becoming much more sophisticated by the day and we must be on our guard at all times.

Rachel and Tracey who gave the talk were very easy to listen to and explained things simply; to start with it was in the form of a quiz. This got the talk off to a lively start and they were then able to begin the serious business of making us aware of some of the latest scams and what to look out for to avoid.

The talk lasted about one hour when we were all glad to have a cup of tea, delicious cakes and a chat with our friends.

<u>On October 28th</u> forty people were really entertained by a fascinating talk and slide show by Reverend Jonathan on his four months ministering on the Falkland Islands, some 13 years after the conflict with Argentina. (photos - page 20)

He spoke of the many memorials over the islands in particular the site located on the hill overlooking Goose Green commemorating the battle where Capt. H Jones fell.

Only 3000 inhabitants live on the islands centred mainly around Port Stanley. There is an amazing variety of wildlife from penguins, dolphins, seals, various species of bird life as well as domestic animals mainly sheep.

There is only one hospital staffed predominately by military personnel, at one time midwives from Barnstaple worked there. To add to the West-Country involvement the island is policed by Devon & Cornwall Constabulary. Jonathan recalled one amusing incident when he and another man bravely (or foolishly) rescued an Emperor penguin that had wandered into a minefield area only to be told by the vet that this was a regular occurrence!

From Kira Farm:

Kira Farm is once again preparing for the 2024 students to return home as they are reaching the end of their year's training. One of their final learning goals will have been their

practical business training, where, for two weeks, they will have created and run their own small businesses. The experience will have helped them put their skills into practice and overcome any challenges, equipping them to turn their knowledge into real ventures. They will, too, have looked at ways to use what they've learned from their time on Kira, to transform not only their own lives but also those of their families and people in their communities. Gloria, a graduate from last year is one example of what it is possible to achieve. She says:

"I am determined to help other people succeed. I already train four young people in tailoring. I teach others conservation farming so they have enough food and I support my siblings' education. I feel beautiful and loved".

In addition to completing final skills targets for their students, Kira has also played host to Pilton Community College giving the visitors the opportunity to immerse themselves in the unique experience. One of the highlights has been their work on an eco-toilet project at the local primary school, where they constructed walls by recycling old bottles - a fantastic hands-on lesson in sustainability. 

From Amigos:

Joseph, the Family Sponsorship Co-ordinator, and his wife, Margaret, recently went to the Global Missions Conference of Nations (GMCN) in Nairobi, Kenya which brought together over 340 attendees from around the world. At the conference, Joseph set up a beautiful display of hand crafted items to raise funds and awareness for Amigos Worldwide attracting a lot of interest in Amigos Many attendees were drawn to learn more about the charity's work in Uganda and its new initiatives in Southern Sudan – which we mentioned in last months' Messenger - with brochures on hand to share the charity's mission and impact.

Earlier in November, I had the pleasure of meeting – by Zoom - people both from the team in Amigos Barnstaple and also from the team in Amigos Uganda, along with other supporters of Amigos Worldwide and returned Kira Farm graduates. We met Joseph the Family Sponsorship Co-ordinator, Joshua, responsible for Kira Farm, and Robina, the Country Director of Amigos Uganda. They all spoke of their work in such a loving caring, understanding way; completely committed to what they do and the disadvantaged people and groups with whom they work, and Robina particularly passionate about the humanitarian /community empowerment work of Amigos Worldwide. She focused on the youth of Uganda, the need to give them a chance in life - on the need to educate them, train them, empower them and care for them. The majority of the population in Uganda is young people (forecast to number over a billion 18-30 year olds in 2060) and without them there will be no future. They need to be trained that all are equal, that everyone has worth and value and is special - particularly the girls - and to see one another through God's eyes. It was a true privilege to hear her and her colleagues speak and to be at the meeting.

Then from this meeting was launched the Amigos Christmas appeal, the theme focusing on the youth of Uganda 'a vibrant and dynamic group with immense potential'. It aims to raise money that will support young Ugandans, to develop skills, to thrive, and to bring about positive change within their communities.

We pray that the appeal will inspire and make a meaningful difference in the lives of young people in Uganda.



BOOK REVIEW AND MORE

When Bad Things Happen to Good People - Harold S Kushner

This wonderful and insightful book has been around for over twenty years but I have only just got round to reading it. Although some of the terminology used would not be acceptable today, it is still as relevant now as it was when first written.

Harold S Kushner is an American Rabbi who suffered a family tragedy in his early married life. He and his wife welcomed Aaron, a seemingly healthy boy into the family. It soon became apparent that Aaron was not thriving, so



his health was examined and eventually he was found to have an incurable, very rare condition called 'progeria' or rapid ageing. It was unlikely that the boy would live beyond early teens and his growth would be seriously stunted.

He and his wife were told the news on the day their daughter was born. One cannot begin to imagine how devastating the news was, made even more challenging on the day they had their daughter. The natural reaction of the young couple was 'why God' and the unfairness of the situation. Being a religious family they put all their energy into making life as happy and creative for the boy as possible. Harold always knew that one day he would write a book about his journey but the time was not right yet.

A few years after the death of Aaron at aged 14 he wrote this book. He gradually came to the understanding that God does not send bad things to people to test them. Bad things happen for many reasons, he was however able to focus on the good that came out of Aaron's life. He remembered the help and love he received from his congregation and his neighbours, how they made smaller sized playthings for him so he felt included.

Years after Aaron's death Harold was able to reflect on how much more he understood of the suffering of others and he felt it had helped his calling to ministry.

For anyone who has suffered loss or tragedy (and that must be everyone) I heartily recommend this book. It is not always easy to understand why such losses occur, but if we can accept that we have not personally been singled out, then we can start to work on all the positive aspects, such as the love of family, neighbours and friends. Harold reflected on all the love and care shown by friends, neighbours and congregation and knew that Aaron had brought joy to many.

GINGERBREAD MEN

Since I have had the pleasure and honour of helping the children ice cookies and cup cakes (see photo - page 8), I have tried quite a few variations on a theme to find the most foolproof gingerbread recipe. I finally ended up with the one below, very simple and foolproof. I found it works best with block margarine or 'baking block', they spread more with a soft margarine. (photo - page 20)

Ingredients

12 oz (350g) plain flour	1/2 tsp bicarbonate of soda
2 tsp ground ginger	1 tsp ground cinnamon
4 1/2 oz (124g) butter or hard margarine	1 free-range egg
6 oz (175g) soft brown sugar	4 tbsp golden syrup
Mathad	

<u>Method</u>

1. Gently melt the fat and golden syrup

2. Sift the dry ingredients and add the brown sugar, breaking up any large lumps

3. Lightly beat the egg and add to the dry ingredients together with the melted syrup and fat, collect into a ball and lightly knead until it looks smooth.

4. Wrap in cling film or place in a polythene bag and chill for at least half an hour

5. Have ready at least two large baking trays, lined with baking paper. Pre-heat the oven to 180C / 160 fan / Gas 4

6. Roll the dough to 1/4 inch (0.5cm) and cut out the shapes. I find it easiest to cut the dough in half and roll half at a time. Bake for 12 - 15 minutes. This dough works well to re-roll, as there will be lots of space between the biscuits.

7. When cool, ice and decorate if desired or call in the children to do it. This is the part they love.
